Good progress is being made now on the new home of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Mels, which is being erected on North Union street. The home will probably be completed within the next several weeks.

"Bob" Hammett, for three years a member of the Furman University football team, died this week of tubercular meningitis. Hammett will be remembered here as one of the stars on the Furman team that defeated Davidson for several seasons.

The best route to Kannapolis now, according to persons who have to drive there often, is via the old Lee factory road. This road connects with the regular highway about two miles north of Concord, and is in fair shape now. This is the most direct and shortest route to Kannapolis.

The bad houses on display at the Pearl Drug Company, are for sale and are being handled by the Woman's Club. In an effort to arouse greater interest in birds the club offered prizes for the best houses and the three on display were presented and declared winners, and are now for sale.

Ree Beglar, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Beglar, was painfully injured several days ago when a young cow she was leading started running and she was caught in the chain. The child suffered sore blisters on her breast, right shoulder and right hip, and has been confined to her bed since the accident.

People traveling from Concord to Salisbury are using a many roads now while the regular highway is being repaired. One route is via the old Salisbury road, others are going via Kannapolis, and still others are going via Faith. The Faith road is said to be in excellent shape but is about four miles longer than the others.

A number of Carolina alumni are planning to go to Greensboro Saturday to witness the Carolina-Virginia baseball game. The game proves the biggest collegiate baseball game of the state each year, and is always witnessed by thousands of fans. The two teams are about evenly matched this year, and the game promises to be a good one.

The city still has a force of hands at work on South Church street, widening that part of the street extending from Means street to the Lexington-Carroll Company on the east side of the street some of the buildings are being moved back, the telephone company is having its poles moved and other changes are being made preparatory to widening the street.

The registration books have been open several weeks, but they close Saturday, and those persons who have not registered are advised to do so by not later than Saturday. Absentee votes will not be allowed in the election, as they do not apply to municipal elections.

Mrs. Yorke will begin at once the construction of a modern new home in Statesville, where she will move as soon as the home is completed. He plans to move into his new home by this fall.
