Col. "Shake" Says No More New Orleans For Him. Charlotte Observer. "Yes, they 'treated us rough,' as the boys would say," said Col. Shakespear Harris, of Cabarrus, one of the greatest soldiers of the Confederacy who lives to tell the tale. "Col. 'Shake' was talking about New Orleans and the treatment of the Confederates at the recent reunion. "I have been to all the reunions except one," said he, "and that was at Tulsa, and never before have we been treated other than white, but no more New Orleans for me. They doubled the street car fare on us, also the price of the ride up the river. They didn't provide any place for us to sleep, and literally took no notice of us at all. Never again will I go to New Orleans. If they didn't want us they shouldn't have asked us, but as far as I am concerned I would not go to New Orleans. "After the magnificent treatment we had in Richmond last year, when the people gave themselves and all they had to us, the treatment we got in New Orleans was a shock. "Surely there must be a new citizenship in New Orleans. There certainly can't be any true southern people there. No more New Orleans for me."
