## REPORT OF GRAND JURY MADE TO JUDGE WEBB

(Continued from Page One)

ing been whipped with limb of tree; prisoner claims he is ruptured in both sides and afflicted with piles, and was unable to work at the time he was whipped. This prisoner is also suffering from cataracts on both eyes, and has asked for treatment and been refused. We find upon investigation of the following prisoners that the entire body of prisoners go to work at sunrise and work until 12 o'clock, noon; 40 minutes for dinner and stop work at sunset.

We, the grand jury, recommend that the entire prison body go to work at 7 o'clock, one hour for dinner, and stop work at 6 o'clock, and in the event that prisoners have made over 10 hours per day they get credit on their time for any and all time worked over 10 hours per day.

Complaint of prisoner, D. I. Stanbery. This prisoner says he has T. B. and has applied to Captain Blackwelder for treatment without receiving any and was compelled to work while sick. We recommend that D. I. Stanbery be taken to the state T. B. specialist now scheduled to be in Concord at an early date, and if patient is found to have T. B. we recommend that he have such necessary treatment required for this disease.

We the grand jury recommend that suitable leather straps with buckles be furnished to all prisoners to support their shackles from working on ankles. We find a large number of shackled prisoners without these straps, all of whom are suffering with sores on their ankles from constant contact of shackle ring.

We have prisoners complaining of having to work in the rain until their clothes are wet and they are sent to camp and allowed to go to bed with wet clothes on. We recommend that all prisoners not be worked at any time when it is raining and that in the event any prisoners' clothes become wet from any cause that he be given dry clothes.

Carl Millisap. We find upon examination that the above party is suffering with venereal disease and we recommend that this prisoner be put in jail and given proper treatment daily until cured by the county physician.

We, the grand jury, earnestly recommend a careful medical examination of No. 1 Camp of nine persons reported by the superintendent to be afflicted with venereal diseases, and we further recommend that these prisoners be separated from the rest of the prisoners and given proper treatment and be cured of their diseases before being allowed to do further work in any way that would be detrimental to the progress of their recovery. We further recommend that all patients now serving as prisoners on the county gang who are afflicted with acute or chronic syphilis be kept separate from all other prisoners, and further that these prisoners so afflicted be provided with independent dishes, wash pans, bath tub, towels, soap, wash rags, and clothing. We further recommend that each and every one of these afflicted prisoners have medical attention daily by the county physician.

We further recommend that the county physician and county health officer furnish to the next grand jury of the next term of court a complete record of the number and names of all prisoners afflicted with chronic or acute venereal diseases together with a complete report of the sanitary condition of the quarters provided for the chain gang prisoners, and a complete report of the No. of treatments administered to each prisoner afflicted with venereal diseases and whether or not said prisoners were treated while being on the county road or elsewhere.

We find upon investigation that the corn bread administered to prisoners of No. 1 chain gang camp is anything but wholesome and satisfactory for the prisoners to eat. We also find the entire meal that was prepared at the noon hour of April 23 to be insufficient in quantity to do manual labor upon. We therefore recommend that our county board of health send the home demonstrator to each of the chain gang camps once each week and investigate the manner in which all food is prepared, and also write copies of recipes of such food preparation as may be found necessary to provide proper and wholesome food for the prisoners. We further recommend that the county demonstrator furnish to the next grand jury a complete report upon the number of visits to each of the county chain gang camps together with a proper analysis of the food served to prisoners.

Provisions at Camp No. 1: 7 sides meat, 90 lbs. salt, 100 lbs. meal, 275 lbs. flour, 1 dbl. molasses, together with other necessary provisions. We recommend sugar and coffee for the prisoners at breakfast at Camp No. 1.

We the grand jury recommend a J. B. Colt gas lighting system for chain gang camp No. 1. We also recommend suitable reading material for prisoners while not at work.

It was reported to the grand jury that the following prisoners at No. 1 chain gang camp had been abused, reprimanded and shackled after having made the foregoing statement of ill and inhuman treatment. In order to verify this report a committee of jurymen was appointed to make investigation, and upon their investigation they find five prisoners with shackles on, on April 27 that were not on April 23, at the time said prisoners made first report of ill treatment at the hands of the superintendent. We also find upon second investigation of the prisoners at No. 1 camp that there was no justifiable cause for putting the shackles on these prisoners and it is plainly evident that this action was taken by Supt. Blackwelder as punishment to the prisoners for having made reports to the grand jury. The following prisoners are among those who were shackled after having made report to the grand jury:  
R. B. Soles, Arthur Crowder, a fellow called Peat; these three along with two others.

We also find upon the second investigation that one prisoner named Peat had a very bad case of toothache and asked for medical treatment and was

refused with the reply from Supt. Blackwelder: "that's a you, why didn't you have the grand jury take you to the doctor." We also find that the prisoners have been refused the right of purchasing milk and other food for personal use on account of having made their report to the grand jury.

Willie Okley reported to Superintendent Blackwelder each day for one week that his nose was bleeding each day and that he was getting very weak from loss of blood, and was compelled to work each day and refused any medical treatment.

It is recommended by the grand jury that a new superintendent be hired for the chain gang and that Supt. Blackwelder be discharged for cruel and inhuman treatment to the prisoners.

We further recommend that the superintendent of the county chain gang be required to make a report to the next grand jury of the number of prisoners punished and the manner in which they were punished and also report to the grand jury a complete report of all prisoners and their names, who ask for medical treatment, and also a complete report of the nature of each complaint.

We, the grand jury, having acted upon all bills and made the foregoing investigations set forth in this report feel that we have justly and fully discharged our duties and therefore ask His Honor, the Judge, to dismiss us for the term.

**NEAR EAST RELIEF**

**Cabarrus to Have an Opportunity to Save 600 Human Lives.**

Concord and Cabarrus county will have their opportunity tomorrow to save 600 human lives, and at the same time help exterminate the miasm, by giving its discarded and cast-off clothing to the Near East Relief.

Tomorrow is Bundle Day, set for the state by Dr. E. C. Brooks, state chairman of that great humanitarian organization, set by proclamation of Governor Morrison, and arranged locally by Mrs. Ernest Hicks, clothing chairman for Cabarrus county. Mrs. Hicks is asking this county for 3,000 pounds of discarded winter clothing.

This can be taken to the city Bundle Station at Dr. Buchanan's office, mailed to Mrs. Hicks, or shipped by freight or parcel post at the Near East Relief clothing warehouse at Raleigh. It takes an average of five pounds of clothing to clothe an Armenian in such a manner that he will not freeze to death.

Mrs. Hicks believes that every one in Concord has at least one suit of clothing which he has discarded, and in which there is still some wear. She wants that. Send it to her tomorrow. You will have double satisfaction—know that you have saved a human life, and that you have decreased the breeding grounds for miasm in your own home. Do it now.

Many of these sufferers from miasm, hampered, preponderance and brutality, were found last winter, who had dragged themselves for miles, suffering from acute rheumatism, pneumonia and frozen feet, simply from a lack of suitable clothing. The climate of Armenia closely approximates that of our New England states, and is bitterly cold in winter.

On account of this rigorous winter the Near East Relief cannot use palm beach suits or other summer clothes. Burlap bags and flour sacks take care of their needs in summer, but they must have warm clothing in winter.

Mrs. Hicks and the Near East Relief organization are especially anxious to obtain as many as possible of coats, sweaters, trousers, wool gloves,

boots and shoes, blankets, sheets for bandages, and any heavy warm garments in which there is still some wear.

The Near East Relief cannot use lace, chiffons, veils, evening clothes, or high heeled slippers, muslin underwear, straw or frame hats, and silk stockings.

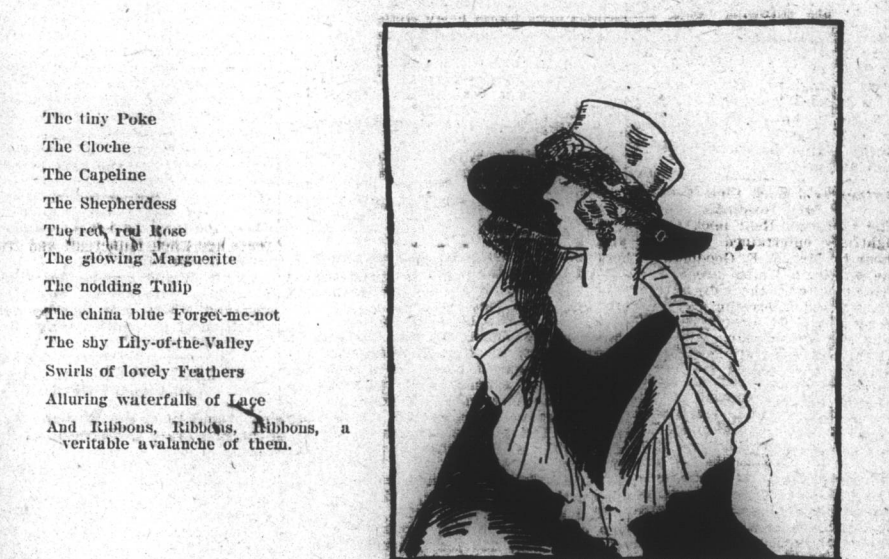
