## ELECTRIFY MOUNTAIN GRADES FOR WORLD'S HEAVIEST TRAINS

Virginian Railway Awards \$15,000,000 Contract to Eliminate Steam in West Virginia.

New York, May 3.—The Virginian Railway, which runs from Norfolk, Va., over the Allegheny Mountains into the coal fields of West Virginia, hauling some of the heaviest trains in the world, has awarded a \$15,000,000 contract for the electrification of 213 miles of its system to the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company.

The section of the road to be electrified lies between Mullens, W. Va., and Boone, Va., and includes the heaviest grades on the line. The contract was said to be the largest of its kind ever awarded.

The road, with its present steam equipment, handles 7,000,000 tons of coal yearly, using three enormous steam engines to move each 5500-ton train over the mountain grades at a speed of seven miles an hour. The electric locomotives to be installed, it was said, will haul 9000-ton trains at a speed of 14 miles an hour, and it is hoped later to put on locomotives that will move 12,000-ton trains at a 14-mile speed.

Power will be supplied by a 90,000-horsepower generating plant to be erected on New River, in West Virginia. The Virginian equipment will be made at the East Pittsburgh plant of the Westinghouse company and will require 18 months for completion.

## NEWS OF THE CHURCHES

## SUCCESSFUL REVIVAL AT KERR STREET CHURCH

Meetings Conducted by Rev. D. V. York. Attended by Many—Traveling Prayer Meetings.

The series of meetings held at the Kerr Street Methodist Church during the past two weeks by Rev. D. V. York, evangelist, came to a close Sunday night. The revival proved one of the most interesting and helpful ever conducted by the Church, and it is felt that much permanent good was effected.

During the meeting about seventy persons either reconsecrated or gave their lives to Jesus, and increased interest was noted at each meeting. In addition to the regular services in the Church Mr. York and members of the Church conducted traveling prayer meetings in a number of the homes of the Church members and others in the homes of their neighbors, and much good resulted also from these meetings.

A report from the revival shows that the prayer meetings were held in 148 homes, in which 242 people declared they were trying to live as Christians. In these homes 244 people did not profess Christianity.

In these 148 homes 1,132 prayers were offered and 109 were sinners, members of the households taking part in leading the prayers and in conducting the song services.

The evangelist secured co-operation on every hand during the revival and at the last service expressed gratification at the manner in which the revival had been conducted and supported.

Mr. York is now conducting a series of services at the Epworth Methodist Church.

## Revival Services at Methodist Protestant Church.

Interest in the revival services being held in the Methodist Protestant Church is steadily increasing. The congregations are large and good is being done. One of the special features of the meetings is the music, which is devotional and inspiring. The services are held each night at 7:30 o'clock and the public is cordially invited to attend. The subject for the sermon tonight will be "Bidding Jesus Depart."

## To Build New Business Structure.

That Mr. W. M. Linker, who recently purchased the Captain William Probst property on East Depot Street, plans to erect a modern business structure on the property was indicated by statements Mr. Linker made before the board of aldermen Thursday night.

Mr. Linker stated that he would erect a three-story building on the lot, the structure to be modern in every way. The house that now occupies the property will be moved to a lot on Church Street which Mr. Linker recently purchased. The aldermen granted Mr. Linker permission to move the house on Church via Church Street, and the street will be blocked while the house is being moved.

## LETTUCE FOR EVERY SEASON.

Lettuce has come to be a staple vegetable on the city table. It appears in many families almost as often as potatoes and fills a dietary need quite as important. It supplies in cheap and most palatable form the vitamins A, B and C, which have been discovered to play so large a part in health maintenance.

Next to Swiss chard, lettuce is the most profitable vegetable for the home gardener. It will be found even more useful than chard, for it will be welcomed on the table every day, which can easily be said of chard. Every well-planned home garden should provide for a succession of lettuce crops which will provide the finest quality for the longest season; and this takes careful planning.

Lettuce is a cool season crop. When hot summer comes it runs to seed so quickly that from the last of July to



the first of September it is possible only in shaded beds, carefully tended, which comparatively few will bother with. But during the rest of the garden year some variety of lettuce is possible.

There are four types of lettuce generally grown in this country—leaf, butterhead, crisp-head and cos. All lettuces tend to make heads and in California all do. In some other sections it takes coaxing to make any of them head. It requires to be grown fast without check, to produce the tender, sweet leaves that we enjoy. The soil, then, must be light, quickly warmed, as rich as possible, especially in nitrogen, and there should be a plentiful supply of water. The richest spit in your garden should be chosen for lettuce and then it should be manured, if possible, and additional feeding with nitrate of soda is advisable.

## A DIFFERENT SALAD DRESSING

One-half teaspoonful of salt, scant dash of cayenne pepper; one tablespoonful of catsup; four tablespoonfuls of oil, adding gradually; one clove of garlic mashed upon the dish and fragments removed; one tablespoonful of tarragon vinegar. Mix all ingredients except the oil, then stir this in a little at a time briefly until all is incorporated, or mix all at once and blend with an egg beater.

## H. H. YOUNG IS HELD FOR SUPERIOR COURT

Bond Fixed at \$1,000 for Rowan Man Charged With Burning Unoccupied House.

Salisbury, May 3.—H. H. Young, a farmer living several miles from the city, was sent to the Superior Court under a \$1,000 bond today by W. L. Ray and C. E. Espersman, magistrates, who found probable cause in a case in which Young is charged with burning an unoccupied dwelling. The house belonged to Young and was situated several miles east of the city. A family who had been occupying it for some months had moved out but some of their furniture was still in the building when it burned. Young offered no evidence at the hearing today and only a few of the 40 or more witnesses summoned were heard. Deputy Insurance Commissioner Scott worked up the case against Young.

A trial that attracted considerable attention in county court was that against Clyde Flinn, at Forsyth county, indicted in connection with a larceny and receiving case growing out of the disappearance of an automobile. Flinn was found not guilty. G. B. Johnson, all of Forsyth, indicted in the same case had a not pro entered in his favor.
