LOCAL MENTION

Cotton on the local market is quoted today at 23 1/2 cents per pound; cotton seed at 80 cents per bushel.

Eleven new cases of measles were reported to the county health department Friday. No other cases of disease were reported.

Mr. S. A. Ackley will address the Men's Bible Class of the First Presbyterian Church tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. His subject will be "The Delity of Christ."

The Board of Trustees of the Jackson Training School is scheduled to meet in semi-annual session at the institution on Tuesday, May 8th, at 10 a. m. The meeting is to be an important one.

Dr. Gilbert T. Rowe, one of the leading Methodist preachers of the South, will conduct a series of revival services in the First Methodist Church at Albemarle beginning tomorrow and continuing two weeks.

The Cabarrus Chapter American War Mothers will meet Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the home of Mrs. A. S. Wolf. Delegates to the state convention held at Wilson, will make their report at Tuesday's meeting.

Mr. Zebulon Teeter returned Friday from Davidson county, where he has just closed a very successful school year as principal of the Denton High School at Denton. Mr. Teeter will visit home folks in this city and county for a few days.

The Gilwood, White Hall, Brown Mill and Pink schools closed their year's work Friday. At each school exercises were held in the afternoon and evening, and despite the threatening weather, good crowds were present at each school.

Mr. Boyd Biggers and Mr. Bally Host have returned from Pinehurst, where they attended the sessions of the North Carolina Bankers' Association. Mr. Biggers is connected with the Citizens Bank and Trust Company and Mr. Host with the Cabarrus Savings Bank.

Tax books are open now, and everyone in the county is expected to make his 1923 tax return during the month. While the books are open at all times the listers are not at appointed places except on Saturday, on which days they are kept busy by property owners.

The Trinity baseball team won another game Friday, defeating Wake Forest 5 to 2. The Methodists played airtight ball behind excellent pitching by Dempsey and the game was never in doubt after the third inning when Trinity scored her first three runs. Trinity has not lost a game to a college team in this State this season.

The funeral of Rev. Jacob Simpson, who died at his home here Friday morning, will be held tomorrow, Sunday afternoon, at 2 o'clock in Forest Hill Methodist Church. Mr. Simpson was well known and greatly beloved throughout this city, and hundreds of friends and admirers plan to attend the funeral services.

The ordinance passed Thursday night by the aldermen prohibits parking on the north side of East Depot Street between Union and Church Streets. The ordinance was published Friday, and with its publication became a law. There was some confusion as to whether the law affected the north or south side of the street.

Two negroes were the only persons tried in recorder's court Friday. One was charged with transporting liquor and the other with having liquor for sale. Both are bound over to court and sent back to the county jail. The negroes were arrested several days ago and officers making the arrest charge that a half a gallon of liquor was found in the car with them.

Some of the steel beams for the new High School building have been put in place, and the structure is beginning to take definite form. The beams to be used in the structure are among the largest ever used in Concord and the steel and iron workers have been kept busy during the past week getting them in place. Brick work on the structure continues, and much progress has been made within the past several weeks.

While a large number of persons have already signed up for examinations during the tuberculosis clinic, a number of appointments are still open, and persons desiring to get one of the appointments should communicate with the county health department at once. The clinic will begin next Tuesday and continue through the 19th, the examinations to be made free of charge by Dr. Spruill, who has conducted two other successful clinics in this county.

Rat killing was a favorite sport with a number of persons here Friday. While cleaning off the debris that collected when the row of buildings was torn down on the new property of the Cabarrus Savings Bank, hundreds of rats were found. Every time a brick or a piece of paper were moved during the cleaning up process Friday, a large rat would dart out, seeking safety. Many of them were killed by boys and grownups, who spent some time in rat chasing. Some of the rats were grey with old age, it is stated.
