CUPID'S STOCK EXCHANGE IS BOOMING IN GERMANY

Fewer Births and Fewer Deaths Than Before the War, But Marriage License Clerks are Very Busy.

Berlin, May 24—Fewer babies are being born in Germany now than before the war and fewer people are dying, but the marriage license clerks are doing more business than during 1913.

The statistics for Wuertemberg, Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and Mecklenburg-Strelitz have not yet been received at official headquarters here.

Babies appeared in the states reported at the rate of 23 for every 1,000, as against a proportion of 28.9 before the war.
