### THE DUTIES OF A COUNTY WELFARE SUPERINTENDENT

As set forth in the Consolidated Statutes, the duties of a county superintendent of public welfare are as follows:

- (a) He shall be chief school attendance officer of the county.
- (b) He shall be chief probation officer, and with the County Juvenile Court, have oversight of dependent, neglected and delinquent children under 16 years of age.
- (c) He shall enforce the child labor laws.
- (d) He shall have oversight under the direction of the State Board, of persons discharged from hospitals for the insane and from other States institutions, and of all persons on probation or parole.
- (e) He shall have, under control of the county commissioners, the care and supervision of the poor, and administer the poor funds.
- (f) He shall act as agent of the State Board in relation to any work to be done by the State Board within the county.
- (g) He shall promote wholesome recreation in the county and enforce such laws as regulate commercial amusement.
- (h) He shall have, under direction of the State Board, oversight of dependent children placed in the county by the State.
- (i) He shall assist the State Board in finding employment for the unemployed.
- (j) He shall investigate into the cause of distress under the direction of the State Board, and make such other investigations in the interest of social welfare as the State Board may direct.
