The chief desire of a Christia should be to become a man or a woman of prayer. There is no way by which we can more directly advance the cause of Christ and than by much prayer. The of usedetermined by the

measure of spirit-ual power possessed and exercised for others' good. One's walk through the world, their work for the world and their warfare against the powers of darkness that overshadow the world, are altogether dependent upon prayer.

The Bible basis of prayer is found in the relationship that exists between God and His believing people. The God and His believing people. The sons of men become the sons of God through faith in Jesus Christ. Titen, because they are sons, God sends forth the Spirit of His Son into their hearts, rerying "Abba Fathen" "The Spirit Himself beareth witness with our spirit that we are the children of God." This relationship is entered into by faith I and is made real in experience by the Indwelling Holy Spirit From this prayer issues as naturally as water from a spring. The prayer of communion is the necessary outcome of the relationship between Father and child.

There is another relationship into which Christians enter, as clearly seen in Rev. 1:5-6, where we read that Christ loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood and made us to be kings and priests unto God. Comparatively speaking, only a few of God's people possess their possessions in this sphere, hence the limited number of real intercessors—those who pray for others. The priest is one who represents man to God, one who responds to the apostolic appeal found in I Tim. 2, "I exhort therefore, that first of all supplications, prayers, intercession and giving of thanks be made for all men, for kings and for all that are in authority, that we may lead a quiet and peaceful life in all godiness and honesty, for this is good and acceptable in the sight of God, our Saviour, who would have all men to be saved and to come into a knowledge of the truth." 
