LOCAL MENTION

One new case of measles was the only new disease of any kind reported to the county health department Friday.

Mr. W. D. Postian of South Rowan, phoned to this office this morning that he had a cotton bloom Friday, the 29th.

The Mission Band of Trinity-Reformed Church are giving a "claw party" at the rear of the church this afternoon from 5 till 9 o'clock.

Mr. John Garmond, of No. 8 township, brought a cotton bloom to this office today, reporting that it had blossomed Friday, the 29th.

Mr. Hal B. Arthur, of No. 2 township, was the first to report a cotton bloom for this year. He brought one to our office June 28, which was picked from his field the day before.

Don't forget the lawn party which is to be given by the Junior Library Association at the Y Tuesday, July 3rd. Ice cream, cake, candy and cold drinks will be sold.

A freak cucumber is on display in the window of this office, brought in by Mr. H. L. Ritchie, of Route 4, Concord. The cucumber is a double one, being joined together its entire length.

Little Annie Edith Sherrill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Sherrill, is confined to her home on Franklin avenue on account of illness. The child became ill Friday and but little improvement is noted in her condition today.

The county commissioners will hold their regular July meeting at the court house on Monday. The meeting promises to be one of interest, although at this time it is not known that any business of unusual importance will be presented to the board members.

Mr. Al Johnson, the first golf professional to make Concord his headquarters, left Friday night for Sumter, S. C., where he has accepted a position as professional with the Sumter Country Club. The local country club has not yet secured a professional to succeed Mr. Johnson.

The next term of Cabarrus Superior Court will be held in August, not July. During the past week the impression has become almost general here that Superior court meets next month and numerous inquiries have been made here as to the exact time the next session of the court will be held.

Quite a bit of work has been done recently on the Concord-Charlotte road. Several large stretches of the road have been paved recently, and one report reaching Concord states that most of the stretches will be connected during the next several weeks. The work is progressing favorably now both in Mecklenburg and Cabarrus counties.

Four defendants were tried in recorder's court here Friday. The four men being tried on six counts. One man was fined \$25 for having liquor and \$15 for being intoxicated. Bob Crockett, negro, charged with assault with a deadly weapon in two counts, was forced to pay the costs. The four defendants paid a total of \$55 in fines.

Prohibition Agent Widenhouse and Deputy Sheriff Caldwell seized two new stills near Thunderstruck Bridge Friday. The stills had been cut out but had not been placed together. They were of about 20-gallon capacity. Thursday, according to a report here, Mr. Widenhouse seized a complete still just across the line in Stanly, a few miles below Mr. Pleasant.

Equipment to be used in the construction of the new home of the Cabarrus Savings Bank is being received here daily now. Part of the huge crane which will play such an important part in the erection of the steel work on the building, has been placed on the ground, and other equipment is being received daily by the contractors. The work of preparing the concrete base for part of the structure continues.

A snap of real cool weather struck this county Friday afternoon and night. From torrid summer temperature the mercury dropped to spring temperature, and a few light overcoats were seen on the streets here Friday night and this morning. No hailstorm was reported in this section of the country Friday, but the drop in the temperature indicated that hail fell somewhere in the surrounding territory.

A number of cotton mills in this county will be idle part of next week. The mills in Kannapolis will close on Thursday, according to reports reaching here, and one mill in this city will be standing all of the week, while others are expected to close Tuesday night for the Fourth of July and remain standing the rest of the week. The week which embraces July Fourth is usually a holiday week for the mills of this county.

Mrs. J. F. Armstrong and Franklin, Jr., left this morning for Lake Junaluska where they will remain for some time. Mrs. Armstrong goes to attend the National Conference on Social Service which opens tomorrow morning with a sermon by Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of Washington, D. C. This conference which lasts for the entire week will be addressed by many of the leading pulpit men and women of the United States and Canada. Mrs. Armstrong received her appointment from Epworth League headquarters at Nashville, Tenn., and is as far as known the only representative from this section.

KANNAPOLIS TEAM WINS FROM SWIFT AGGREGATION

Eleven Inning Game Played at Kannapolis Thursday.—Two Games For Next Saturday.

In one of the snappiest games played in Kannapolis this year, the Cabarrus Y team of that city won from the Swift Manufacturing team of Charlotte Thursday afternoon in an eleven inning game. The final score was 2 to 1, and play throughout the game was of the smartest type.

Today the Kannapolis team has gone to Cooleenoe, and expects to win the game easily.

Next Saturday, April 7th, Albemarle will play two games in Kannapolis. The Kannapolis mills will be closed, and for that reason two games were arranged. The first will be played in the morning, and the second in the afternoon.

Baseball in Kannapolis this year has been so popular that it has been necessary to double the seating capacity of the grandstand at the park. Large crowds have attended all of the games and still larger crowds are expected for the remainder of the season. Fast, clean games have been offered this year and the fans are showing their appreciation by attending the games in big crowds.
