DEATH TUESDAY NIGHT OF MRS. LAURA ALLEN BOST

Had Been Ill For Several Weeks—Funeral To Be Held Tomorrow Afternoon. Mrs. Laura Allen Bost, wife of M. E. Bost, well known carpenter of Concord, died Tuesday night at 10:30 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Tom Eady, on Kerr street.

Mrs. Bost was 62 years of age and had made her home in Concord for about 18 years, moving here from Catawba County, where she was born and married. Surviving are her husband, several children and several brothers and sisters.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon at 2 o'clock at Kerr Street Methodist Church, and interment will be made in Oakwood cemetery.

Mrs. Bost was a member of Kerr Street Methodist Church, and was an active Church worker. She was known and greatly admired by a wide circle of friends in this and Catawba counties.

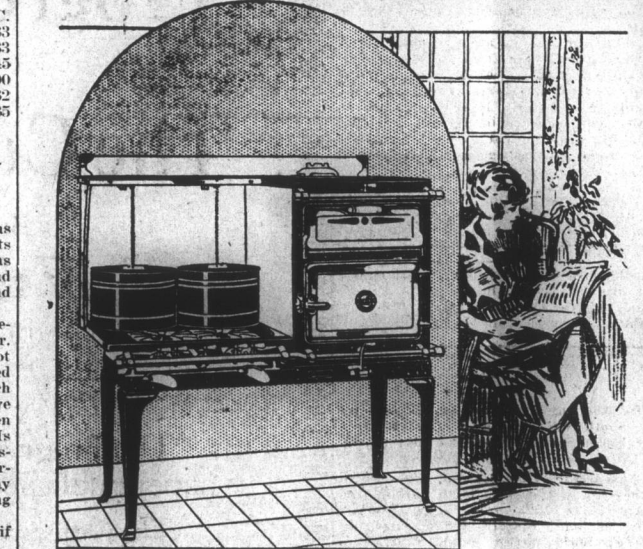
