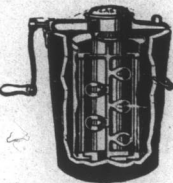

MRS. J. F. HINSON DIED AT HOME THIS MORNING

Death Occurred at 3:14 O'clock After Illness of Ten Days.—Funeral This Afternoon.

Mrs. Agatha H. Hinson, wife of J. F. Hinson, died at her home here this morning at 3:14 o'clock. She was ill for about 10 days, and had been critically ill for the past several days.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at Kerr Street Methodist Church, and interment was made in Oakwood cemetery.

Mrs. Hinson was 49 years of age, and is survived by her husband, eight children and one brother. The children are Lee, Jesse, Dora, Oscar, Sam, Homer and Evelyn, all of Concord. A. M. Hurlocker, of Concord, is the surviving brother.

Mrs. Hinson was a member of the Kerr Street Church, and was actively interested in Church work. Her death caused sincere sorrow among her wide circle of friends.
