Mr. Rob Roy Peery, of Hickory, N. C., son of Dr. R. B. Peery, pioneer missionary to Japan, will have charge of the music in St. James Lutheran Church on Sunday morning. Mr. Peery is one of the winners in the Etude prize contest, and is a violinist, organist and composer of growing reputation.

Mr. Oglesby's name was placed in nomination by Jimmie Caldwell, of Albemarle, who attended the State convention with Mr. Oglesby. Col. Wiley Rodman was chosen Commander for the next year.

CHARLOTTE STILL HAS CHANCE FOR SPEAKER

French Ambassador Invited to Make Armistice Day Address. Washington, Sept. 13.—Charlotte still has a chance to get Ambassador Jusserand for its Armistice day celebration. Senator Overman in a letter to the French Embassy joined with the chamber of commerce of Charlotte in extending the invitation to the French ambassador, and the Charge d'Affaires De France replies in part: "As I already answered the chamber of commerce, M. Jusserand is now in France, and I do not know whether or not he will be back for that date, but the invitation has been forwarded to him, and as soon as I am in receipt of his answer I will not fail to let you know."

Deputy Rankin Leaves Salisbury Hospital. Salisbury Post. Deputy Sheriff R. Lee Rankin, who was shot by Walter Parnell, last Thursday afternoon near Woodleaf when Parnell, who had been arrested by the officer, attacked him and made his escape, later being captured by Sheriff Kfider, who was leading a posse in the hunt for the officer's assailant, was discharged from the Salisbury hospital late yesterday afternoon and is now at his home at the jail, being jailer as well as chief deputy to the sheriff.

It was at first thought Mr. Rankin was seriously wounded but it later developed that the ball did not penetrate the intestine but after entering the fleshy part of the abdomen ranged upward under the left arm, where it was extracted. Mr. Rankin was able to ride up to the courthouse yesterday and appear before the grand jury making inquiry into the case against Parnell. He afterward returned to the hospital and later in the evening was discharged and is now at home. He hopes to be able to resume his official duties in a short time.

Salem College Opens. Winston-Salem, Sept. 13.—With the ringing of the historic old college bell, the 152nd annual session of Salem college and academy was opened at 10 o'clock this morning with a large enrollment of old and new students. The brief exercises, preliminary to the beginning of actual class room work, were held in Memorial hall, and there was present the student body, members of the faculty, and a number of visitors and friends of the institution.
