LOCAL MENTION

Mr. B. E. Harris has been appointed notary public by Governor Cameron Morrison. Mr. Harris has received his commission from the Governor.

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Byrd are today moving into their handsome home on North Union street. The house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Byrd will be occupied in the future by Mr. Charles E. Parks and family.

Henry B., two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Motley, died Friday afternoon at the home of his parents in No. 2 township. Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock at Fairview Church, and interment will be made in the cemetery there.

Everything is quiet in police circles here, local police officers state. Only three cases were called in recorder's court Friday and since that time no new cases have developed. Two boys charged with climbing the stand pipe were tried Friday, judgment being suspended upon payment of the costs.

There will be a business meeting of the Music Club at the Central School auditorium on Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock, immediately preceding the last rehearsal for the War Mothers Concert. Business of importance will be transacted, and all members are urged to be present.

A public meeting will be held in the court house here this evening at 7:30 o'clock under the auspices of the Concord Textile Union. Several men prominent in union work in North Carolina, including C. P. Barringer, President of the State Federation of Labor, will speak at the meeting. The meeting will be a public one and the general public is invited to attend.

Miss Martin, returned missionary from Brazil, will speak before the Grier Bible Class of the First Presbyterian Church at the Sunday school services tomorrow morning. Miss Martin was heard with interest in the Church at the prayer meeting service Wednesday night and she is certain to be heard by a large number of women tomorrow morning.

Mr. J. E. Dayvault has returned to his home here from a Charlotte hospital, where he underwent treatment for some time. Mr. Dayvault's condition continues to improve, but he goes to Charlotte at regular intervals for further treatment. Mr. Dayvault has been suffering with blood poison and part of one finger on his left hand had to be amputated.

Miss Helen Patterson has received from her brother, Mr. Fred M. Patterson, a fine German police dog. The dog was secured by Mr. Patterson while he was in Germany this year and as he is still a student at the University of Pennsylvania and has no place to keep the dog there, he forwarded it to his sister here.

The race in the National League is over for another year. By defeating Brooklyn Friday, the Giants became pennant in the National League for the third consecutive time and gained the right to play the Yankees for the world championship. The series will begin October 10th, the first game to be played at the home of the Yankees.

The Davidson College football team won its second game of the year Friday when it defeated Presbyterian College 3 to 0. A field goal was responsible for the Davidson victory, the two teams being about evenly matched in practically every department of the game. The game was played in Rock Hill and was witnessed by a large crowd, a number of Concord fans being among the spectators.

On Friday, October 5th, a baby clinic will be conducted at Rockwell for the benefit of several prominent foreign physicians who are visiting the United States studying health methods of the United States. Miss Gazele, local county health nurse, and Dr. Buchanan, county health officer, will assist the Rowan nurse and county physician with the clinic, one of several to be held in this State for the benefit of the visitors.

A number of race horses have already reached the fair grounds and warming up exercises are held at the grounds almost every day now. The exercises are held every Tuesday and Friday and numbers of persons have been going to the fair grounds to see the horses in operation. Interest in the fair continues to increase, and when the formal opening is made on October 16th persons from all parts of this and adjoining counties are expected to be present.

The condition of W. R. Quarterman, the young senior of the Collegiate Institute at Mount Pleasant, who had the misfortune to break both wrists and an elbow in a fall from the third story of one of the main dormitories, is considered quite favorable to a complete recovery in time. Experts Find Chemistry Helps in Washing Clothes.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 29.—Chemistry and physics of the modern laundry will be discussed by recognized experts at the annual convention of the National Laundry Owners Association here October 1-5, says W. E. Fitch, general manager.

"Our scientific phases of laundry work," Mr. Fitch continues, "are planned to interest every housewife and every man who sends a shirt to the laundry. Several years ago the laundrymen established a fellowship with the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research at Pittsburgh, where Dr. A. F. Shupp has been engaged in laboratory experi-

ments in connection with every problem involved in the washing of clothes.

"The results of these investigations into textile strength, dyes, and the removal of dirt and stains absorbed into the fiber of fabrics, are regularly bulletined to the association members, and this service gradually is placing laundering upon a standardized scientific basis." The association numbers 2,000 members and represents 75 per cent of the total capital invested in laundries in the United States.

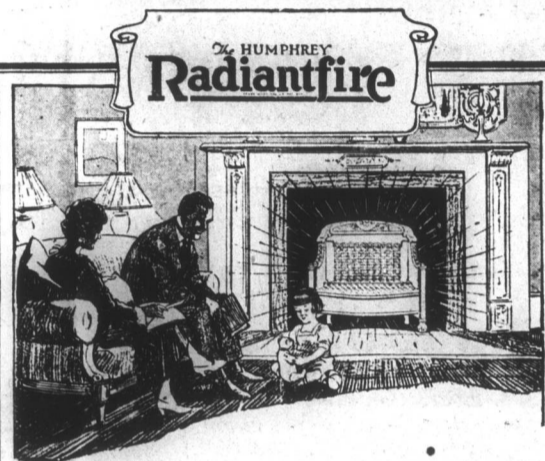
