CARTER RETURNS TO TUM'S TOMB SCOFFING AT "SPOOKS" ON GUARD

American Egyptologist to Resume Work Observing All Respect for Remains of Pharaoh.

London, Oct. 5.—Howard Carter, the American Egyptologist, left for Luxor and the Valley of the Kings today to resume his excavations at the Tomb of Tutankhamen. The scientist said he had not the slightest belief that any occult influence was responsible for the death of the Earl of Carnarvon, who succumbed to fever after discovering the tomb, and that he had no fears for himself in that direction.

"It is rather too much to ask me to believe that some spook is keeping watch and ward over the dead Pharaoh, ready to wreak vengeance on any one who goes too near," Carter said.

At Trieste he will be joined by the American experts who are to assist him in the unearthing of Tutankhamen's sarcophagus, and this task will be started soon after their arrival at Luxor. Carter expects this season's work to last about four months. He reiterated his intention of leaving the mummy of the Pharaoh in his present resting place.

"If we disturbed the body," he said, "we would be no better than the tomb robbers of other days. All we shall do is to examine the body and the manner in which it was laid, and from our findings we shall probably be able to learn much about this young king of the Nile which is at present unknown. After our investigations are finished we shall leave Tutankhamen to his eternity."

Great Work of Plane.

Charlotte, Oct. 4.—With Earl Manes, 19, of Mecklenburg county, facing the possibility of developing rabies and delayed eight days in obtaining Pasteur treatment serum because of lack of supplies here and at the State Board of Health at Raleigh, John E. Crowell, of Weddington, near here, obtained the treatment by an airplane trip to Columbia, S. C., it became known today. The Curtis biplane made the round trip in about three hours.

MITCHELL TERM OF COURT TO CONVENE ON OCTOBER 22

Special Term Called On First Legal Day: Judge Finley Will Preside. Raleigh News and Observer.

A special term of Mitchell County Superior Court was called yesterday for Monday, October 22, and Governor Morrison expects the action to do much to relieve the tense situation created in the county last Wednesday by an alleged assault upon Mrs. Mack Thomas, which was followed by the forced deportation of all the negro laborers in the county.

The Governor expressed confidence that the local authorities will create an organization sufficient to insure the enforcement of law and order and that it will not be necessary to keep troops in the county indefinitely but indicated he will keep them there as long as their presence seems necessary.

Expressing regret that under the law a court could not be convened next week, the Governor yesterday fixed the date of the court for the earliest possible day under the law and cancelled the criminal term of court scheduled for Avery county on the week of October 22 in order that Judge T. B. Finley and Solicitor John J. Hayes, the resident judicial officers of the district, may officiate at the Mitchell county court. A special term of court will be given Avery county later, if desired.

John Goss, the negro who escaped from a State convict camp at Spruce Pine immediately after the alleged assault, has been positively identified by Mrs. Thomas, the Governor awaiting this action before calling the term of court.

It is expected that about 75 leaders in the movement to deport the negroes will also be arrested and tried at the special term.

London Fears Stresemann's Fall May Mean Civil War for Germany.

London, Oct. 4.—The reported resignation of Chancellor Stresemann is regarded in official quarters as a probable step toward civil war in Germany.

No precise information concerning the confused situation in Berlin is obtainable here, but diplomatic report received today declares the Ludendorff group in Bavaria is totally unable to come to an agreement with Adolf Hitler.

The report also quotes a dispatch from the general commanding the Reichswehr in Bavaria. He says the soldiers remain loyal to the Republic, but if trouble breaks out and they are asked to move against the Bavarians, it would, owing to their close association with nationalist organizations, cause them "spiritual anguish."

It is also stated in another report which comes from what is described as the best diplomatic source in Munich that the Bavarian leaders, owing to their ability to get coal from Czechoslovakia and feed their country from within, believe Bavaria can hold out, even if the rest of Germany dissolves in chaos.

Turkey Also to Join Family of Republics

Constantinople, Oct. 4.—The new Turkish constitution will provide that Turkey be proclaimed a republic, with a President elected for a period of four or five years, it was learned today.

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
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
