LOCAL MENTION

Concord Presbytery will hold its fall meeting on Tuesday, October 16th with Prospect Church.

The regular weekly meeting of the Concord Kivans Club will be held at the Y. M. C. A. this evening at 7 o'clock.

Rev. M. A. Blackwelder will preach at Center Methodist Church in No. 1 township, next Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

The Charlotte-Concord Bus Line announces that in the future it will operate a 6 a. m. bus to Charlotte each Monday morning.

The condition of Miss Gertrude Shaw, who has been confined to her room at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Davis, is reported as being somewhat improved today.

Mr. George Harvell, who has been working with the shoe department of Ehrd's for several weeks, has resigned his position with that company and on Saturday will move to Charlotte, where he will make his home in the future.

No session of the city's recorder's court was held this morning, no cases being on docket for trial. This is the first court day in some time that no cases were docketed for trial, and indicates that everything continues quiet in police circles here.

A series of revival services will begin at Epworth M. E. Church, South, next Sunday. The pastor, Rev. M. A. Osborne, will be assisted by Rev. W. A. Rollins, who will preach every evening at 7:30 o'clock. No day services will be held.

Most of the tile and concrete floors for the new home of the Cabarrus Savings Bank have been laid now. This work has been in progress for the past several weeks, and when completed other important work will be started on the structure.

The Concord high school football team left this morning at 11:45 o'clock for Charlotte where it plays the Charlotte high team this afternoon. The team made the trip to Charlotte in auto, and will return immediately after the game. A number of fans from the city went to Charlotte this afternoon to see the game.

The commissioners of Cabarrus County are holding a special meeting at the court house today. The meeting was called by the board for the purpose of discussing with the county board of education the special election to be held on November 20th, it was stated. So far as is known now no other business will be presented to the board.

Federal Court, which had been in session in Charlotte all this week, adjourned Thursday at noon. Adjournment was made, it was stated in Charlotte, when announcement was made that Mrs. E. Y. Webb, wife of Judge Webb, who was presiding at the term of court, was critically ill at her home in Shelby. Judge Webb left Charlotte as soon as court adjourned.

Dr. S. E. Buchanan, county health officer, is spending the day in Salisbury, assisting Dr. Armstrong, county health officer for Rowan, with a baby clinic being conducted at Rockwell. A number of physicians and health experts of international reputation are in Rowan this week and the clinic is being held to demonstrate to them health methods used in North Carolina.

One of the outstanding features of Annual Fashion Show, tonight at 8 o'clock at the Central School building, will be the music rendered by Prof. Doyle, head of the music department of the city schools, Misses Morrison, McLaughlin, Patterson and Mrs. Pickard. There are no admission charges—just a silver offering for the benefit of the treasury of the local King's Daughters. The public is cordially invited.

The management of the Parks-Bell Co., which will stage the fashion show at Central school this evening, announced this morning that everything was in readiness for the event. Models to display the various dresses and draps for ladies, misses and children have been engaged, and the musical stars who will appear on the program have been rehearsed. The general public is invited to the show, which will begin at 8 o'clock.

The football menu for tomorrow offers little hope to fans in North Carolina, most of the Carolina teams being scheduled to meet stronger teams. Carolina plays Yale, State plays Pen State and Davidson plays V. P. I. Trinity will play Randolph-Macon at Durham, while Wake Forest and Guilford will meet at Wake Forest. Few games of real importance are scheduled for this week, most of them being in the nature of practice contests.

The annual meeting of the medical convention of the district which embraces Cabarrus County, will be held in Monroe on October 9th. The program has been announced for the convention and includes talks by Dr. John A. Patterson and Dr. P. R. MacFadyen, of this city. Dr. Patterson will talk on "Infected Tonsils" and Dr. MacFadyen will talk on "Cystic Ovaries." Many physicians from this county expect to attend the sessions of the convention.

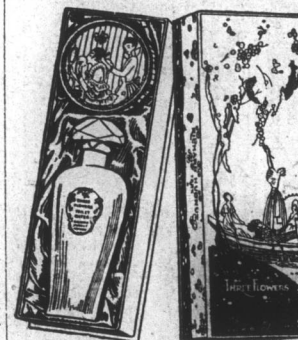

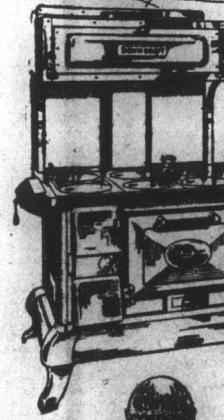
