Smoot Drafting Expenditure Tax Bill

Senator Reed Smoot of Utah is back from Europe and in his capacity of chairman of the senate finance committee is busy with plans for the Sixty-eighth congress. After conferring with President Coolidge, Senator Smoot, chairman of the finance committee, said: "We feel sure we will keep the expenses of the government for the next fiscal year well within \$3,000,000,000. We should and I believe we will reduce the running expenses of the government \$200,000,000 the next fiscal year as compared with the present year."

A tax on luxuries and extravagant purchases is the purpose of an expenditure tax which is being prepared by Senator Smoot to be presented to the next session of congress as a substitute for the proposed sales tax. Senator Smoot said that all farmers' sales up to \$4,000 would be exempt. Cheap commodities, such as a \$3.50 pair of shoes or an inexpensive automobile would not be taxed, but expensive purchases, such as a \$2,500 automobile or a \$7.50 pair of shoes, will be taxable at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent.

"The sales tax, which caused considerable debate at the last session of congress, will not be revived," Senator Smoot said.



Lawyers Investigating Judicial Ethics



Justice Pierce Butler of the United States Supreme court, chairman of the judicial section of the American Bar association, have been authorized to appoint a committee of judges to prepare a code of judicial ethics for adoption by the association at its 1924 meeting. A report of the association's committee on judicial ethics which failed of adoption this year will be considered by the committee appointed by Justice Butler. Its main features are these:

"A judge's conduct in every particular should be above reproach. He should be conscientious, studious, thorough, courteous, patient, impartial, just, fearless of public clamor, regardless of public praise, and indifferent to private, political or partisan influences."

"He should not allow other affairs or his private interests to interfere with the prompt and proper performance of his judicial duties. A judge should be courteous to counsel, especially to those who are young and inexperienced. He should not act in a controversy where a near relative is a party if such course can be reasonably avoided."

These bonds are to be prepared under the supervision of the United States Mortgage and Trust Company of New York City, which will certify as to the genuineness of the signatures of the City Officials and the seal impressed thereon. Legality will be approved by Chester B. Masslich, Esq., of New York City, whose approving opinion will be furnished to the purchaser without charge.

General obligations of the City; unlimited tax for principal and interest authorized by law and ordinance.

Bids must be enclosed in sealed envelopes marked "Proposal for Bonds" and be accompanied by a certified check (or cash) of \$1,760 upon an incorporated bank or trust company, to the order of the City Treasurer, to secure the City against any loss resulting from failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid; the bonds will be delivered on or about November 15, 1923 in New York, or, at purchaser's expense for delivery and exchange, at the place of his choice. The right to reject all bids is reserved. No bid under par will be entertained.

May Increase the Tariff on Wheat Above 30 Cents a Bushel.

Washington, Oct. 5.—Instructions have been given the federal tariff commission by President Coolidge to consider the possibility of increasing the present duty on wheat above 30 cents as a means of relief for the western wheat growers. The chief executive, however, does not believe that any material benefit could thus be rendered the farmers. A suggestion that the tariff on wheat be increased from 30 to 45 cents a bushel under the flexible provision of the Fordney-McCumber act recently was laid before the President by Representative Anderson, Republican, Minnesota, who was chairman of the Congressional commission on agricultural inquiry. The proposal also has been advanced and opposed by others who recently have conferred with the President on the agricultural situation.

New York, Oct. 5.—A brick dropped from the 11th floor of a building under construction at 43rd Street and Madison Avenue yesterday, crashed through the top of an automobile standing at the curb and killed three-month-old Carrie Clark in a hammock suspended from the roof of the car.
