They are exclusive agents for basic lime phosphate, and agents for Walkers spray and mop muchine, which has been so successfully used in Georgia in combatting the boll weevil. Grass and clover seeds are also handled together with all kinds of grains. A stock of about \$3,000 is carried. Shipments amount to 300 to 500 bushels of wheat a gear; 1,000 bushels of seed oats; 256 bushels of syze, and 200 tons of cotton seed. The bissiness is located at Soath Church street in a brick building 50x75 teet and is patronized by a large circle of farmers. W. F. 
