Haynes Launches a New Gampaign
Against "Home Brew."

Washington, Oct. 19.—Prohibition
Commissioner Haynes has launched
upon a new campaign against homebrew, In order to stamp out what he
characterized as "the menace" of upon a new campaign against home-brew. In order to stamp out what he characterized as "the menace" of trafficking in home-brew ingredients, the commissioner announced today that he would revoke the permits of all brewer-ies which continue the practice of mak-ing malt syrups, now widely used as a base for home-made beer. All breweries will be notified, said Mr. Haynes to "cease the manufacture of such syrups at once, and failure to do so will result in prompt citation and revocation of their permits to manu-facture cereal beverages. "It is the intention of the depart-ment to absolutely stamp 'out the menace in all sections of the country in a campaign to halt the manufacture and traffic of homebrew ingredients at the source."

The new policy was decided on after a conference between Commissioner Haynes and his legal staff.
