

DIED THIS MORNING

Death Due to Complication of Diseases
After Child Was Accidentally Burned.

Willie Marion Preslar, six-year-old
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Preslar,
I died at her home here this morning at 7
o'clock, following an illness of three
weeks. The child was severely burned
three weeks ago while placing some coal
on a fire and death was due to a complication of maladies that set in following the actident.

decided Jater. The services will be conducted by Rev. G. A. Martin, pastor of
the First Baptist Church, of which the
parents of the deceased are members.

her burns were not regarded as fatal at
the time of the accident, it soon developed that the child was more seriously
injured than at first thought, and the
