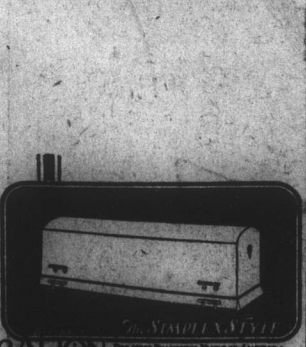
Miss Foll is the second young girl to serve as page in the senate, former Senator Yarver's daughter having served at a previous session.
