It is said that busses operating through Concord will be put on a regular schedule in the near future. In some parts of the State the corporation commission already has the busses on schedule and the busses operating in this section probably will be scheduled next week.

The April meeting of the aldermen of the city will be held at the city hall on Thursday night of this week. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 8 o'clock. It is not known now whether any business of unusual importance will be presented to the aldermen at the meeting.

Eleven defendants were tried in recorder's court Monday and nine of them were convicted. They paid fines totalling \$72.25. If it is necessary to hold a runoff primary it will be held on April 18th. A number of candidates are in the field, with the greatest interest being aroused in the mayoralty race between Mayor Womble, J. L. Miller and C. H. Barrier.
