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ALDERMEN DISCUSS VARIETY OF MATTERS AT MEETING

Board Was in Session More Than Two Hours Thursday Night—Report on the Proposed Fire Alarm System.

The aldermen discussed a variety of matters when they met for their April meeting at the city hall Thursday night. Several of the matters presented to and acted upon by the board are of more than usual interest.

The aldermen were advised that a number of mad dogs, have been reported in the city and county and they were asked to adopt an ordinance requiring all dogs in the city to be vaccinated. The ordinance was passed and dogs must be vaccinated at once. Last year the vaccine administration cost about \$3.00, but this year the cost will be only \$1.00.

The street committee was authorized to make arrangements to care for water that runs over the property of Mrs. W. C. Barber on Allison street and the property of M. J. Corl on Pearl street. J. L. Miller, who was asked by the board to investigate the cost of installing a modern fire alarm system in the city, made a report at the meeting. An eight-box system would cost about \$21,350, the report stated.

The board ordered that St. Mary's street be paved provided that the city did not have to pay more than half of the costs of the work.

Horsburgh Case is Settled and Warrants Are Recalled.

Fayetteville, April 1.—The Horsburgh case is settled so far as the directors of the Prince Charles Hotel are concerned. This statement can be made positively on the authority of directors of the Community Hotel company, of which Robert M. Horsburgh was secretary before he left here suddenly on January 7, and the warrant charging him with forgery and embezzlement, sworn out by representatives of the hotel corporation Saturday when they learned that the missing secretary had been located in Memphis and recalled tomorrow morning. No statement as to the amount involved in the settlement was made. But one of the most prominent of directors of the company stated tonight that the whole case had been "settled satisfactorily."

No details of the settlement were given out, but it is recalled that John C. Arbogast, father-in-law of Mr. Horsburgh, was quoted as having said while in Memphis that he would "make good personally any shortage credited to his son-in-law." In fact, it has been understood here since shortly after Horsburgh's disappearance that such an agreement existed. SAYS CO-OP HEADS DREW HUGE SALARIES

Senator Person Alleges That Mr. Williams Got \$40,000 and Patterson \$30,000. Raleigh, April 1.—Franklin county farmers made a furious onslaught against the co-operative here today when the committee investigating sat a day and took in the disaffection in the ranks. Former Senator W. M. Person led the opposition. He declared that the biggest Franklin farmer had sold his 1922 crop for \$3,500 less than the same amount brought on the independent floors, the co-operative landlord selling through the association and the tenants on the independent market.

Senator Person mercilessly assailed the salary schedule of the association. He declared that Mr. Williams, one of the head men now dead, drew \$40,000; that Mr. Patterson pulled down \$30,000; and that other evidences of gross and indefensibly high overhead had driven the contract makers to madness. He believed it impossible to enforce the contracts any longer and prayed the relief demanded. The Franklin senator thinks the committee of nine who heard the walls from the stricken farmers are a very fair body and he believes they will see the cause in a friendly light.
