State College opened its football season Friday with a 20 to 0 victory over Richmond University. At the same time Elon was holding King College to 4 points. The State team showed flashes of real power, although all of the scoring was done in the first and last quarters.

Information coming in from ginners in the county show that ginning up to date is far ahead of what it was last year. According to G. W. Lyle, the number of bales ginned prior to September 16, 1925 was 1738 while up to the same date last year (1924), only 379 bales were ginned.

Friday was a very busy day at the local cotton platform. Cotton raisers began bringing in their cotton early in the morning and they were still at it late in the afternoon and early in the evening. Quite a bit of the cotton sold here Friday was from Stanly county, it was reported.

The Wake Forest-Carolina and Davidson-Wofford football games are attracting the football fans of the State today. The former probably will go a long way toward deciding the State championship and for that reason is creating the greater interest. Concord is well represented at each game.

BLUEFIELD MOTOR PARTY IN CONCORD
(Continued from Page One)
Address: "The Old North State"—Dr. Howard E. Rondthaler.
Closing Remarks—Toastmaster.

Several very entertaining musical numbers were presented by the personnel of the Bluefield delegation. In the addresses of the evening, the wonders of West Virginia were pointed out; its great resources in coal, its great undeveloped resources in agriculture and its remarkable climate. Speakers showed that 36 years ago, the place where Bluefield now stands consisted of two farms, where today ground sells for \$1500 per front foot.

They also pointed out, in regard to the Lakes-to-Florida Highway, that the worst strip in the entire length of the road, that immediately adjoining Bluefield, was now under contract and that the part of the road in Blad county would soon be opened for contract, making a modern thoroughfare throughout the entire length.

Many of the visitors who made addresses in Salisbury commented on the North Carolina roads, declaring that they were among the most impressive features of the trip. The churches and the schools in the state were also complimented.

The principal address of the evening was made by Dr. Howard E. Rondthaler, of Winston, who declared that North Carolina success was due to two geographical facts. The first was that in the 593 miles from one end to the other, every climate from the Gulf to Canada was exhibited in epitome.

The other fact was that the invisible bar of sand on the coast of the state had given North Carolina a different philosophy and had kept the state free from the domineering influence of any large city. The miracle of the whole thing was, he said, that the "Rip Van Winkle state" was not only now fifth in agriculture but it now led the South and Southwest in manufacturing, and had done so without destroying the preponderance of rural population. This was accomplished through the development of hydro-electric power in the state, he declared.

Dr. Rondthaler's address, delivered in his picturesque and original style and with his humorous remarks, was the feature of the evening.
