LOCAL MENTION

The Y. M. C. A. basketball team will go to Greensboro Friday night where it will play the Proximity Y team. The local team has not had a very successful season to date but is hopeful of winning during the remainder of the season.

Mooresville Enterprise: Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Fink have returned from Concord, where they spent several days. Mr. Fink having been called to the bedside of his mother, Mrs. J. C. Fink, who was desperately ill, but who is now improved.

Practically all the work of constructing partitions between the rooms of the hotel has been completed and plasterers will begin their work soon, it is said. The composition roof has been begun but will require several weeks for completion.

The business men's volleyball team will practice this evening at 6:30 o'clock at the Y. M. C. A. The local team is stronger this year than it has been before and much interest is shown in its work. A match game will be scheduled for next week.

The case of Warren vs Propst, which has attracted considerable attention in the city on account of the large number of people involved, was announced as being compromised this morning. The figure at which the compromise was made was not named.

Mooresville Enterprise: Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Dayvault, of Glen Flora, Texas, are spending some time in Cabarrus and Iredell counties visiting old friends and relatives. On last Sunday and Monday they were guests of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Brawley, Mrs. Dayvault and Mrs. Brawley are cousins.

A wrestling match will be held here Saturday night between the local team and the Davidson College matmen. Seven matches are scheduled. Although the locals have considerable strength this year and are expected to have a good season, the Davidson team is expected to win over Coach Derry's men.

Pictures will be shown by the Y. M. C. A. Friday night at the Hartwell Mill School at the request of the people of that community. Movies are given by the Y at Brown Mill, Wineoff school, the county home and at the Second Presbyterian Church. Regular programs are also given at the Y on Saturday night.

A number of the cases in Superior Court here were compromised Wednesday and court was adjourned shortly before noon until this morning. In the case of J. W. Tarlton vs J. A. Patterson, Mr. Tarlton was awarded a total of \$584.40. Much interest is being manifested in a number of the cases docketed for this week.

In the monthly count of automobiles on the State Highways around Concord, the Concord-Charlotte highway at the City Limits as usual had a large number of cars traveling on it. The total number was 2495 with 174 of these cars being from other states. The tabulation was made Wednesday. Complete figures will be given at an early date.

Eleven persons were examined for tuberculosis at the Free Clinic which is being held this week at the County Health Office. The clinic is in charge of Dr. S. E. Lee, of Sanatorium, and a large number of people are taking advantage of the opportunity of having the examination while he is in the city.

Company E, which is planning to put out a team in the City Basketball League, has made arrangements to practice several times a week at the Y. M. C. A. They have secured Marvin Long, former State College player, to coach them and are hopeful of turning out a winner. City League games begin on the first of February.

The regular monthly meeting of the Kiwanis Club Directors was held Wednesday night. L. T. Hartwell, Jr., was chosen Chairman of the Board of Directors, N. K. Reid was named Secretary and Treasurer and Dr. T. N. Spencer was made Sergeant at Arms. Important business matters were discussed by the personnel of the directors.

Persons who keep an eye on the weather have been using the old saying that when snow remains on the ground for any length of time it will snow again. Many have predicted snow this week and cloudiness Tuesday and Wednesday made them believe that their prophecies were correct. Today was bright and clear, however, but was still very cold.

Miss Katherine Riggs, harpist from Washington who was the headliner at the Mother and Daughter Pow-Wow Tuesday night, was delighted with her visit to Concord, she declared, finding the Pow-Wow to be one of the most beautiful affairs she had ever attended. NEAR EAST RELIEF FUND STILL SHORT

Total of \$2,194.08 has been raised Leaving Balance of \$265.92 Before Quota Is Reached.

Near East relief subscriptions, subsequent to the drive Sunday, have been received making the total amount that has been raised to date \$2,194.08, according to J. J. Barnhardt, chairman of the Cabarrus county organization.

This leaves a balance of \$265.92 to be raised to complete the quota allotted to the county. Supporters of the Near East Relief work in Cabarrus county were urged by Mr. Barnhardt to help in filling out the amount needed for the full allotment.

"We hope to raise our quota during this month and urge those interested to help us take care of our part in the work," said Mr. Barnhardt, in speaking of the drive.

Subscriptions will be received by either Mr. Barnhardt or by John M. Scott, state treasurer, Charlotte, N. C., Post Office Box 1198. Persons who have not subscribed to the Near East are asked to send checks to round out the Cabarrus quota.

The Campaign for the National Park. With a half a million dollars subscribed to date, the campaign in North Carolina and Tennessee for funds for the purchase of lands in the Great Smoky Mountains to be turned over to the federal government for a national park is being renewed in the counties of Eastern Tennessee and of Western North Carolina. In Asheville and Buncombe County a grand total of \$202,500 has been contributed; a total of \$220,000 has been subscribed in the city of Knoxville; more than \$65,000 has been donated in the counties of Western North Carolina outside of Buncombe county, and in the cities and towns of Eastern Tennessee progress is being reported from every quarter.

During the month of January the campaign will be waged aggressively throughout all Western North Carolina and Eastern Tennessee in an effort to raise the \$350,000 that is being sought in these sections, outside of the cities of Asheville and Knoxville. At the same time, actual work in the down-state cities and towns of North Carolina has begun, and headquarters for the Southern Piedmont section have opened this week at Charlotte. Plans are being formulated for the initiation of active campaigns in Nashville and Chattanooga, where it is expected headquarters will be established before the end of the present month.

Every effort is being made, the campaign headquarters has announced, to complete the two states' quotas before March 1st in order that the offer of the park lands may be submitted to Congress at the present session.

FACTS ABOUT COAL STRIKE

Strike began September 1, 1925. Workers involved, 158,000. Collieries affected, 272, serving 823 mines.

Companies involved, 135, of which nine control 138 of the largest collieries. Area affected, ten counties in northeastern Pennsylvania, covering 500 square miles, virtually the only commercial anthracite in the United States.

Maintenance men remaining on duty to preserve property, 8,000. Loss in wages per day, \$1,150,000. Loss in daily production, 206,000 tons.

Cause of suspension: Expiration of two-year contract, August 31, 1925, and failure to reach new agreement.

Demands of miners: Ten per cent, increase in tonnage rates; \$1 a day additional for day men; check-off; equalization of day rates; two-year contract, and other features.

Reply of operators: Would not consider demands that increased cost of mining, and suggested arbitration.

Negotiations: Miners called convention at Scranton, Pa., and formulated demands. Joins wage conference began Atlantic City July 9th; negotiations broken off August 4th; resumed December 29th.

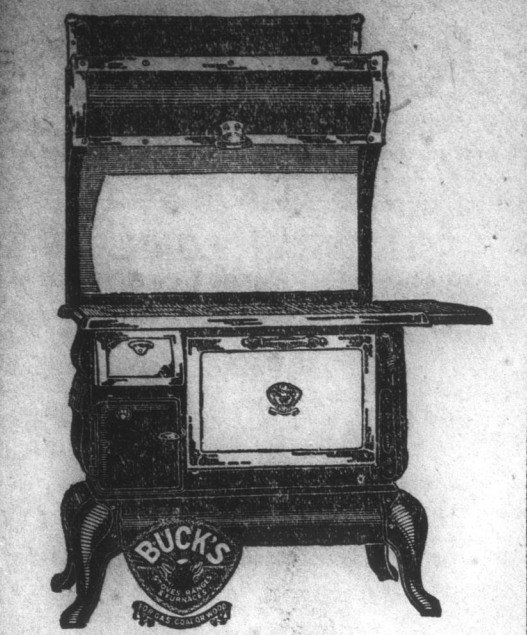

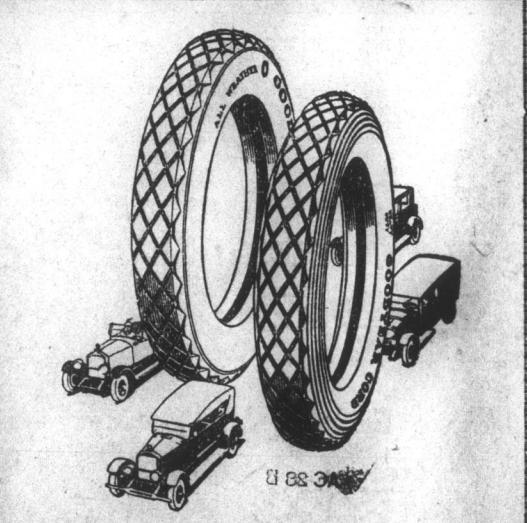
