

The Campaign for the National Park. With a half a million dollars subscribed to date, the campaign in North Caroina and Tennessee for funds for the purchase of lands in the Great Smoky Mountains to be a turned over to the federal government for a national park is being remember of a national park is being remed in the counties of Eastern Tennessee and of Western North Carolina. In Asheville and Baucombe County a grand total of \$202,-500 has been contributed; a total of \$202,-500 has been contributed; a total of \$220,000 has been contributed; a total of \$200,000 has been donated in the counties of Western North Carolina outside of Huncombe county, and in the cities and towns of Eastern Tennessee progress is being reported from every quarter.

During the mouth of January the campaign will be waged aggressively throughout all Western North Carolina and Eastern Tennessee in an effort to raise the \$350,000 that is being sought in these sections, outside of the cities of Ashevillé and Knoxville.
