The Philadelphia Public Ledger recently stated:

"North Carolina is a billion dollar state if one takes the combined value of its manufactured products and its raw material produced on farm and in forest as a basis of calculation.

"With the value of the output of its factories for 1925 mounting to three-quarters of a billion dollars, with banking resources at the close of 1925 amounting to more than half a billion, and with the value of its farm crops for last year going considerably beyond a quarter of a million, the commonwealth in-a material way enters the new year with optimism.

North Carolina certainly will welcome this sister state to a place by her side—a progressive Georgia there would be a heip and not a handicap to North Carolina.
