WOMAN'S TORSO FOUND IN WOODS

Authorities Seeking to Identify the Body Apparently Dismembered by Expert.

Media, Pa., Jan. 21.—The headless and legless body of a young woman was found in a clump of trees today, about one and one-half miles north of this place. An hour later the legs were discovered in high grass fifteen feet away. The head was not found.

On the left wrist was a gold watch, which furnished the chief clue on which State police are working to identify the woman. It bore the initials "H. B. Z. to T. T." and the numerals 6-16-23.

The body was found on the exten-sive estate of Samuel J. Tenderson, a Philadelphia lawyer, and lay a short distance back from a road. The spot is near the club house of the Rose Tree Hunt, whose members are socially pro

Mrs. Sallie Worrell, who resides at Rose Tree nearby, while passing the spot, noticed a bloodstained hundle and reported it to William Bowson, a blacksmith.

He investigated and in the under-

He investigated and in the underbrush found a large brown paper bundle strapped with two men's heavy belts. Opening the bundle, he discovered the torso covered with two newspapers. One bore the date of December 22nd and the other of January 19th.

Examination of the body by physicians showed that it had been dismembered, apparently by an expert. The woman, thought to be in her early twenties, weighed about 120 pounds. The clothing indicated evidence of refinement. Until Saturday workmen employed by Mr. Henderson had been cutting trees sixty yards from the spot where the body lay. The police do not believe, therefore, that the murder could have been committed earlier than Saturday af


