Central Association Held One of the Most Interesting Meetings of the Year Tuesday Afternoon.

The Central Parent-Teachers' Association held one of the most interesting and helpful meetings of the year Tuesday afternoon at the school building.

Miss Mary King gave these encouraging reports of the success of a project recently undertaken by the welfare department of the Women's Club, endorsed and aided by our association. This worthy project is the provision of nourishing hot chocolate or soup to supplement the cold lunches of children who live too far from school to go home for warm dinner. The project of providing milk for undernourished children has been successfully carried on for the past few years, and a fund is maintained constantly for that purpose.

Miss King also told of the splendid work recently begun by the city health department in some of the schools, in the holding of "nutrition classes." This work grew out of a recent visit to our city of Miss Theresa Dandell, of the State Health Department.

It is planned to observe "Book Week" the first week in March, at which time parents, or interested persons, are requested to give books to the school library, or the money wherewith to purchase books. It is desired that these books will be selected from a carefully compiled list of books that are especially good for and interesting to children. This list will be made public very soon.

Mrs. Laura Leslie Ross read a highly interesting and thought-provoking article on "How to Know a Really Healthy Child." Mrs. F. J. Haywood then read of an excellent program of health education now being carried out in the schools of Newton, Mass.

It was decided that the next meeting, to be held March 16th, would be devoted to a program in memory of Miss Constance Cline, who gave so many years of devoted, loyal service to our schools, was so active an officer in our organization, and was so universally beloved in our city. MILBANK MEMORIAL FUND OFFICERS COMING HERE

Will Pay Visit to County Health Department in Swing Through the South.

Dr. S. E. Buchanan, county health officer, has been advised that several officers of the Milbank Memorial fund commission, plan to visit Concord Saturday to see how the county health department is conducted. The following letter explains the purpose of the visit: Dr. S. E. Buchanan, County Health Officer, Concord, N. C.

In order to look in on health department practice in various municipalities and counties in several midwestern and southern states, Mr. John A. Kingsbury, secretary of the Milbank Memorial Fund, and myself are arranging a tour. We expect to visit your department on or about February 20th.

The Milbank Memorial Fund, as you no doubt know, is interested in health work, and is at this time assisting by substantial grants, health demonstrations in Cattaraugus county, New York, in Syracuse, New York and in New York City.

I would appreciate it very much if you would indicate to me whether or not the time specified for our visit is convenient to you.
