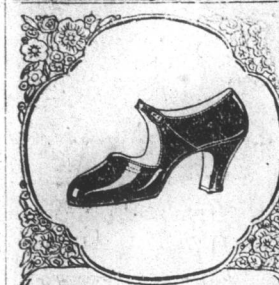

Bradstreet's Trade Letter. New York, Mar. 12.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say:

The stock market has quieted down after last week's feverish activity, and sales are running about 2,000,000 shares a day. Iron prices are tending upwards. The average price of railroad shares is up about 5 1/2 points from the low of last week, while industrials have made a gain of about 8 1/2 points. The treasury department's \$500,000,000 bond issue was oversubscribed, steel production is at the highest rate since March a year ago, with the principal producer operating at about 95 per cent of capacity, in spite of a decrease in unfilled orders. Prices of finished steel are firm, while scrap prices tend higher. Pig iron prices are lower, but coke is up slightly. Building expenditures for February, as reported to Bradstreet's, show a decrease of 8.5 per cent from a year ago, with gains made by New York counterbalanced by loss for the rest of the country. Weekly bank clearings \$9,043,015,000.

Post and Flegg's Cotton Letter.

New York, March 12.—Heavy short covering by Wall street investors gave the market today a strong undertone. It was estimated that over 20,000 shares were covered by one well known operator alone. A good deal of spot house swing of May against purchase of July and October was also in evidence. Whether this selling of May reflects the idea that there will be heavy shipments for May deliveries is hard to say as yet.

Exports for the week were only 77,635 bales, the smallest since last September, and news from spot and goods centers was bearish if anything. The trade continues to pick up contracts on a scale down, but it is doubtful if they will follow the advances. POST AND FLEGG.
