STORY TELLS OF LOSS
OF GAITHER RESIDENCE

Residence of Mrs. W. C. Gaither, Sr., in Hertford, Built in Revolution Army Days, Total Loss.

The following story from a Hartford, N. C., newspaper, telling of the burning of the home of Mrs. W. C. Gaither, Sr., mother of Mrs. G. B. Lewis, of Concord, will be of interest here:

A treasured relic of Revolutionary days was blotted from existence early Thursday through destruction by fire of the beautiful colonial home of Mrs. W. C. Gaither, Sr., in Hertford, with a loss roughly estimated at \$20,000 to \$25,000, partially covered by insurance. The home was totally destroyed, together with much priceless furniture dating also from the days of Washington.

The fire is believed to have originated in the kitchen, from an undetermined cause. It was discovered about 3 o'clock, and had gained such headway that Mrs. Gaither and her two daughters, Misses Helen and Louise Gaither, occupants of the home, were compelled to leave hurriedly with a few personal belongings. Firemen were summoned quickly, but were able only to prevent the destruction of nearby buildings.

For many years, the old home had been one of the show places of the Albemarle section. It was in an excellent state of preservation, and had been the scene of many brilliant social functions. Built by Jack Wood, Revolutionary ancestor of Mrs. Gaither, it had remained in the family ever since.

Two sons of Mrs. Gaither live in this city, vice president of the First & Citizens National Bank, and C. W. Gaither, general manager of the Auto & Gas Engine Work.

Only the five towering brick chimneys are standing as mute sentinels over the ruins. The home was on the west side of Hertford, near the city limits, and was approached by a winding driveway through a beautiful grove, running a distance of nearly half a mile from the highway.

Mrs. Gaither and her daughters found refuge in the home of the former's sister, Mrs. T. F. Winslow, in Hertford, and will remain there for the time being. Mrs. Gaither, who is nearly 70 years of age, was ill from excitement and shock Tuesday.

Prof. Duxbury will dramatize "The Book of Job" in the High School auditorium Wednesday at 8 p. m. and "The Pilgrim's Progress" Wednesday afternoon at 3 p. m.

Embezzlement of Millions in Russian Cooperatives.

Moscow, March 16.—(AP)—Embezzlement amounting to \$5,000,000, occurred in the Soviet cooperative societies during the last year, said the Director of the All-Russian Central Union of Cooperative Organizations. More than 13,000 officials connected with these bodies will be tried.

Similar irregularities are reported in the trade-union organizations. Embezzlement of funds, corruption and frauds generally are alarmingly prevalent. Scores of guilty officials already have been sentenced to long terms of imprisonment.

TUBERCULOSIS NURSE REPORT OF FEBRUARY

Report Shows That Miss Ford Carried on Work Over Wide Area During Past Month. February was a busy month for Miss Margaret Ford, county tuberculosis nurse, according to her report which has just been made public. The report reads: Total number of calls made during month—230. Two tubercular patients admitted to the State Sanatorium for treatment. One meeting of the White Hall Health Club held at the home of Mrs. T. White and a talk given on "Diet in Disease." Two nutrition classes were organized—one class of twenty children at Central Primary and one class of twenty-seven children at No. 2 School. These classes are weighed each Monday and for the past three weeks the majority of children gain from one to three pounds each week. Twelve members of these classes have had their teeth attended to and one child has been employed. The Tuberculosis Association furnishes from one to two quarts of milk daily to tubercular patients unable to purchase same.

PLAN MEETING OF OASIS AT PINEHURST

Ceremonial to Be Held on May 14th Promises to Attract Record Crowd for the State. Members of Oasis Temple are busy now making plans for the ceremonial to be held by Shriners in Pinehurst on May 14th. Owing to the convenient location of Pinehurst, the attendance is expected to set a state record for such events. Arrangements committee members have been advised by members in all parts of the state of their intention of attending. Concord is well represented in the membership of Oasis Temple and it is said that many local members plan to be in Pinehurst for the ceremonial.

Government Life Insurance.

With the final date for reinstatement and conversion of Government life insurance little more than four months distant, veterans throughout the country are responding in such numbers that the veterans bureau is approving over \$1,250,000 worth of insurance per day. General Frank T. Hines, director of the bureau, announced this morning. This means that approximately 240 applications averaging \$5,000 each are being approved every day. While the campaign for reinstatement and conversion now being waged is only about six weeks old, indications are that the volume of applications will increase proportionately as the final date draws nearer and the bureau has made preparations for the receipt and handling of a veritable avalanche of applications. Practically the only difficulty being experienced at present in handling the applications is due to the fact that many applicants are unable to give sufficient details to identify their claims promptly. It is not unusual to receive applications giving merely the initials and surname of the applicant instead of the full name, serial number, rank and organization and other details necessary for prompt identification and Director Hines is urging all ex-service men to be particular about these items in order that the bureau can return service to them may not be retarded for lack of essential information. J. S. Pittman, manager of the regional office of the bureau at Charlotte, N. C., urges all veterans of the World War who may be interested to communicate immediately, either with the Insurance Division, U. S. Veterans Bureau, Washington, D. C., or to the Regional Office of the Bureau at Charlotte, prompt attention being assured in all cases. Modern war paint cost a wealthy young Orange beauty \$300 for a six-month period.
