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WEEKLY COTTON REVIEW

New York, March 26 .- The co New York, March 25.—The cot-ton market has been comparatively quiet during the past week but prices have held fairly steady on a moderate demand. While it is still early in the season, reports of delays in coming crop preparations as a re-sult of cold or wet weather seem to have emphasized the uncertainties of the coming crop start and checked selling in spite of the full graning selling in spite of the full graning figures and continued complaints of a poor demand for cotton goods. At the same time remaining supplies of old crop cotton are considered large eneugh to suggest the probability of increased offerings in the south should price advance and the market, on the whole, would appear to have been waiting for further developments in the spot cituation or for a nearer view of coming possibilities.

The report of the census bureau placing the total ginnings from the crowth of 1925 at 16.103,586 from hing bales, or 16,085,905 bales of 59 bounds grees weight, may have been pounds gross weight, may have been a shade above average expectations. It was not sufficiently so to cause any material change of sentiment as to the probable end season carryover, however, and was without any pronounced effect on the immediate market. The report on the emergence of the boll weevil up to March 15 appeared to make rather a bearish impression on sentiment but upon reconsideration did not seem to be taken as a factor of serious imconsideration did not seem to be taken as a factor or serious importance by the general market, while the cold rains over the south toward the end of the week brought in some buying of new crop months. Notwithstanding the supposedly large supply of cotton still held—in the belt there has been no indication of burdensome figures in the southern spot market and May contracts here have held a premium of some 42 to 45 points over July. Previous reports on the prospective acreage are expected within the near future within the near futur are expected within the near future and judging from current comment is most generally expected to show little if any decrease in the area as compared with last year. There have been some complaints as to the quality of seed for planting which may have had a sustaining influence but have not been particularly stressed as a market factor.

Ferguson was relieved of control of the department upon his own request made in a formal letter to the commissioners, in which he reiterated his innocence but set forth his desire to be suspended until the outcome of the investigation is made public. City commissioners this afternoon said in the investigation and a decision is expected within the next day or so.
