MUSSOLINI

Asheville Citizen. With Italian-born Americans divided in opinion as to the merits of the Fascist movement, some regarding Mussolini as almost a divine-born patriot while by others he is considered an anti-Christ, it is hardly to be expected that the great bulk of opinion in this country should have a clear understanding of the Italian political situation.

Mussolini labors under an initial handicap. Exercise of dominant political power by one man stirs a latent antipathy in this country. Public sentiment is instantly aroused against him and prejudice votes a verdict before the evidence is all heard. Tag him a "Dictator" and at once the suspicion that he is a tyrant obtrudes itself on the mind. We are so accustomed to popular rule, to the division of authority among President, Congress and courts, that we can not reconcile one-man government with political well-being.

Italians and Italian ideas of government are different from ours and so when we measure them with our scale it is quite natural that we do not correctly appraise the Mussolini government. El Duce has been so fortunate, too, as to arouse the antagonism of many influential Americans by repressive legislation directed against the Masons and the liberty of the press in Italy. One must therefore have a revocable license in order to occupy any opinion-expressing position on a newspaper.

A more correct opinion of the Mussolini government and what it stands for, a more just appraisal of its merits and demerits, may likely be found in the judgment of disinterested Americans who are acquainted with Italian political concepts and trace the Mussolini regime from its inception. Such a judgment, we are strongly inclined to believe from the character of the material set forth by Otto H. Kahn, the noted banker and publicist.

Mr. Kahn points out that Fascism came at a time to rescue Italy from chaos in the years soon after the great war. Bolshevists, Communists and social extremists exercised a tyranny over Italy and existing authorities quaking with fear, became mere fig-ures-heads fearing to exercise their functions. Communists, in the guise of labor unionists, seized factories and declared themselves owners. Patriotism was derided and atheism exalted.

It was in this emergency that the Fascist movement seized control. Its forces evidently represented character and patriotism since they consisted largely of ex-servicemen and representative citizens of many communities. A further proof is that these forces obtained control more by a show than an exercise of force. The Fascist power did not set itself up as a substitute, but as a supporter of the monarchy.

The Mussolini government has since continued to fight the ever-striving Bolshevist movement by direct methods. These we do not fully understand because we do not understand the Italian political mentality and viewpoint. The Mussolini method often offend our ideas of political and personal liberty. We are apt to overlook, Mr. Kahn says, that "More essential than liberty is order and national self-preservation, actual and spiritual. Indeed, true liberty is impossible unless there is order and an adequately functioning government."

We are not seeking to exalt the Mussolini government or represent it as a paragon but only to present the view of it gained by an eminent American of acknowledged good judgment. He insists that Mussolini fairly represents the Italian people and that the exercise of power by him is certainly not so prejudicial to the people as to fake parliamentary government which in some European countries we wrongly consider as analogous to our Congress. We, at any rate, should not accept derivative cartoons of Mussolini as correct portraits without question.
