SERIOUS CHARGES TO BE AIRED IN COURT

Various Criminal Cases to Be Tried in Mecklenburg Court. Charlotte, April 12.—Several important cases are to come up for trial at a term of Mecklenburg Superior Court which will open here a week from today.

Solicitor Carpenter, while in Charlotte Saturday, mentioned some of the headlines scheduled to be called during the term starting April 19. A case almost certain to be tried is that charging Jim Knotts and Oscar Martin with robbing and assaulting Mrs. Mary Wright, aged farm woman of Newell. This case was postponed from the last term of court.

Solicitor Carpenter hinted that several surprises may be sprung when Knotts and Martin are placed on trial. He declined to go into details, however.

The case charging S. E. Schorn, Charlotte business man, with manslaughter in connection with the death of an aged negro, also is docked for trial next week.

The last grand jury returned a true bill against Mr. Schorn who struck the buggy driven by the negro on the Monroe road.

A renewal of activities in the shooting by Charlotte police of A. A. Tarrant may result next week if Tarrant, who is able to attend court, Jake F. Newell, one of his attorneys, said last night, however, that he does not expect the wounded youth's condition will be such as to permit him to attend court for several weeks yet.

Another feature of the term will be the trial of Belmont Sherrill and Mae Thornburg, admitted parents of the baby deserted last Saturday night. The couple is charged with desertion. They were held for the grand jury by Magistrate Cobb yesterday.

MOTHER KIDNAP'S HER LITTLE GIRL

Father Swears Out Warrant and Hearing Will Be Held.

Danville, Va., April 12.—The kidnaping of a three-year-old after Sunday school at Epiphany Church yesterday by Mrs. J. T. Carter, her mother, had a sequel here this afternoon. Her husband, Captain James T. Carter, member of the faculty of Danville Military Institute, recently instituted divorce against his wife. She filed a like action but neither has filed a bill of complaint. Carter has had charge of the two children pending settlement of the case and on Sunday he left them both at Sunday school.

Mrs. Carter appeared in a car outside the church just before the school disbanded and beckoning to her little daughter she climbed in and the car left. The husband later located his wife and child at the house where Mrs. Carter boards but admission was refused. The police lacking a warrant would take no action.

At the last night Captain Carter swore out a warrant charging kidnaping. The police entered the boarding house but Mrs. Carter had left with the child. They were located in a hotel where the warrant was served. A policeman guarded her door throughout the night. Mrs. Carter's attorneys today tried to have the warrant dismissed but failed and the mother was bonded in the sum of one dollar to appear in juvenile court when a decision will be reached. In the meantime she retains possession of her child.
