MUCH ACCOMPLISHED IN LEARN TO SWIM CAMPAIGN

Sixteen Learn in First Half-Hour of Classes Yesterday. Expect to Teach Thousand This Week.

Forty-three boys signed non-swimmer's cards at the Y. M. C. A. for the learn to swim campaign week. This is from two classes. The goal this year is one thousand persons. Those who can already swim will not be taken into consideration in the total figures; although there will be classes for coaching for those who can already swim.

Only persons who cannot swim at all will be allowed to sign a card. Of the first forty-three persons signed up—sixteen learned in one half hour. Following are the names of boys who learned June 14th, from 4:30 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. They swim well across pool, body submerged and head out.

This last boy's name is entered here in order to emphasize the fact that any person should be able to swim. His attention and efforts enabled him to swim after a fashion, although he will never be safe in water waist deep, but with someone watching he can do with his crippled body what a great many powerful and healthy men are not willing to do. The other boys will be swimming in deep water before the week is out, and most of them were eagerly trying out their new wings and straining themselves to keep the rules against straying off into the deep and until instructed to do so.

So many people doubt that a person can be instructed in so short a period; but they need only drop around the "Y" and see for themselves. If you cannot swim, get in touch with the physical director at the "Y" and sign a card, learn what hour will be given you and the rest is easy. It takes longer to sign a card, address, take a thorough bath, get used to the water, than it does to learn to swim across the pool. Remember you must learn first to take a stroke, then get several, then across and then take the length of the pool before you get your card balanced upon your grade given.

Read your daily paper and realize the great loss of life from drowning. One or two every day in North Carolina during the swimming season. You read the article, sigh and remark how terrible it is; but what about your boy, or your girl, or perhaps yourself? Can you swim? What would become of you if you fell overboard while canoeing? Do you know that a woman can drown in water that is deeper than the length of her arm? Did you know that a man who cannot swim will go down feet first? He can take care of himself in water that is not any deeper than his chin. But? Did you know that a woman who does not know how to swim, if she loses her balance will sink head downward and her feet will come to the top? That means that the average woman who is a non-swimmer might easily drown in a large bath several feet wide but maybe only three or four feet deep. Learn to swim now. Don't wait you may save a life.

(By International News Service) Tallahassee, Fla., June 14.—Offering mute testimony of an unchronicled battle that took place here hundreds of years ago, a 5-inch cannon ball was found imbedded in a gnarled oak near the entrance of a new Tallahassee subdivision.
