### M'NINCH TALKS KITCHIN.

#### Governors Senatorial Campaign Manager Gives Out Interview.

Charlotte, July 21.—Hon. F. R. McNinch, Governor Kitchin's state campaign manager, has given out the following interview in this city, where he is detained by sickness in his family:

"The logic of recent and important political events points unerringly to Governor Kitchin's nomination. Progressive democracy has won out in our national convention and will triumph in our state primary. The nomination of Wilson and Marshall was an emphatic repudiation of machine methods, boss rule and the power of special interests, things which Governor Kitchin has consistently and persistently fought.

"The Baltimore platform is progressive and is a severe indictment of Senator Simmons' record. Surely his friends will not now claim that the national convention made a 'personal attack' on our senior senator when it declared that the tariff shall be levied for 'revenue only; that the tariff does not help the farmer or working man; when it denounced subsidies and bounties and endorsed the splendid record of the Democratic house and then clinched it all with the unprecedented declaration that platform pledges are made to be kept. What answer to this indictment by his party can Senator Simmons make? How will he answer to his Democratic constituents upon the several counts for violating the platform as to free lumber, for his votes for protection on iron ore, coal, etc., his vote for the ocean mail subsidy, and his failure to vote and act in harmony with the Democratic house? The platform is plainly, emphatically a repudiation of many important features of Senator Simmons' record and is a complete and positive vindication and indorsement of Governor Kitchin's speeches and course in this campaign.

"The ejection of Lorimer from the senate is another vindication of Governor Kitchin's course. He criticized Senator Simmons for voting for Boss Lorimer, and now the senator admits the governor's case by reversing himself and voting to oust Lorimer. Same evidence, same senator—Presto, change, Lorimer was but a conspicuous example of a rotten system of bipartisan political debauchery. Both Democrats and Republicans voted for his election. The lavish and secret use of money by special interests as in his case, is both alarming and disgusting to honest voters, and his election is but another wave in the rising tide of popular rule which will bear Governor Kitchin into the senate.

"The action of the friends of the governor in asking the state executive committee to construe the 'Democratic ticket' to mean the national, state, congressional and county tickets has greatly strengthened his cause, as it shows he is relying on Democrats for his nomination and is fighting for party purity. His friends and the friends of Judge Clark joined heartily in the request for this construction, while the friends of Senator Simmons, who were in the majority, refused to agree and postponed action. The Democrats of this state want no bipartisan primary at the expense of party principle.

"Another important factor in

this campaign favorable to Governor Kitchin is the fact that there is a widespread and well founded belief that the politicians and would be bosses made an effort in our state convention to shield the vulnerable record of Senator Simmons from public criticism. The people are opposed to the bosses manipulating conventions and are resenting the attempt to prejudice the senatorial contest by such methods. No wonder that the primary plan is sweeping the country and that the people are crying everywhere 'Down with the bosses and ringsters.'

"And Governor Kitchin's speeches have also greatly contributed to the certainty of his nomination. His speeches are unanswerable because based on facts and the record. His enemies tried to distort and misrepresent his speech. Too many have now heard it and know that it is not abusive or personal or unfair, but a dignified, high-toned discussion of only the public record of Senator Simmons and an unanswerable exposure of his departure from the Democratic faith and the majority of his party on certain important questions, together with a strong presentation of the Democratic platform and an earnest plea for the Democratic candidates, national, state and local.

"Information from many sources convince me of the steady growth of sentiment for the governor. In some instances it is remarkable. Some counties which I regarded as decidedly against him only a few weeks ago, are reported now as, for him. Four years ago he got less than 9 per cent. of the vote in the Ninth and Tenth districts combined, but his strength there has increased hundred-fold.

"Public sentiment has set in strongly towards the governor as the type of progressive Democrat who should represent us in the senate, now that we are to have a progressive president, and I confidently predict, an overwhelming victory for Wilson and Kitchin."

### This Is Planned.

It might as well be understood now as later in the campaign that there is one thing the democracy of North Carolina will not stand for, and it is the participation in the senatorial primaries by persons who refuse to vote the democratic national ticket. There are several thousand national republicans in North Carolina who vote the democratic state ticket, and it would be the height of absurdity to allow these high protectionists to say who shall be our next senator. A man who can not vote for Woodrow Wilson is not good enough a democrat to vote in the senatorial primary, and if the state committee rules otherwise there is sure to be a mighty revolt on the part of the boys in the ranks.—Wadesboro Messenger and Intelligencer.

Paragraph 2. According to the rules of the organization no camp can have a vote or voice in the business meetings that is in arrears for its annual dues, and therefore every camp that may be in arrears should at once pay its dues to Gen. W. E. Mickle, 824 Common street, New Orleans, La. Dues for division headquarters only five cents per capita should be paid to the Adjutant-General of this division.
