VILLA WILL NOT BE A CANDIDATE

Mexican Revolutionary Leader Gets Out of Race for Presidency.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 28.—Final announcement from Gen. Villa that he will not be a candidate for President or Vice-President of Mexico was received at the State Department today through George C. Carathers, consul general at Chihuahua City. This dispatch the first to reach Washington from the interior of Mexico since Villa's revolt against Gen. Carranza's authority as first chief of the Constitutionalists greatly strengthened the hopes of officials here for a peaceful adjustment of the difficulties between the two leaders. Special significance was attached to Villa's assurance because it followed so closely the resignation of Gen. Carranza that he would not become a candidate. Villa would give a similar promise and all the military leaders were eliminated as presidential possibilities. The State Department tonight was without information from Mexico City, but it generally was believed in official circles that if Gen. Carranza resigns Thursday as has been declared he will, the convention called by him for that date will name as his successor Fernando Iglesias Calderon whose selection has been demanded by Villa.

OMINOUS CALM PERVADES FIELD

Paris Says There Is Nothing New to Report on the General Situation; Germans Continue to Attack Allies in Violent Manner But Gain no Ground.

Paris, Sept. 28.—The following official communication was given out in Paris this afternoon:

"There is nothing new to report on the general situation. Relative calm prevails along a portion of the front. Nevertheless, at certain points, notably between the river Aisne and the Argonne district, the enemy has delivered further violent attacks, which however, have been repulsed."

Germans Gain No Ground.

London, Sept. 28.—The official war information bureau issued the following this afternoon:

"Last night the enemy attacked our line with even more vigor, but with no more success."

"There is no change in the situation."

"The Germans have gained no ground, and the French have advanced here and there."

Austrians Driven Back.

London, Sept. 28.—6:20 p. m.—A Central News Dispatch from Rome says that the following telegram has been received there from Petrograd:

"The right wing of the Austrians have been driven back beyond the Carpathians into Hungary, where they are being pursued by the Russians."

"The Austrians debacle is complete and they have lost all their artillery."

"The Austrians left wing has retreated to Cracow. The Russians have occupied another one of the forts of Przemyel."

English Naval Victory.

London, Sept. 28.—5:17 p. m.—The official press bureau this afternoon issued the following statement:

"Operations of His Majesty's naval forces on the west coast of Africa have resulted in the unconditional surrender of Duala, the capital of Kamerum, and of Bonaberi, to an Anglo-French force."

Montenegriens Near Sarajevo.

Cettinje, Sept. 28.—The Montenegriens are within artillery range of Sarajevo, capital of the Austrian province of Bosnia.

Przemysl Invested By Russians.

Rome, Sept. 28.—An official dispatch from Petrograd says that Przemyel, in Galicia, is entirely invested by the Russians, and that the main Austrian is retiring behind the Carpathians.

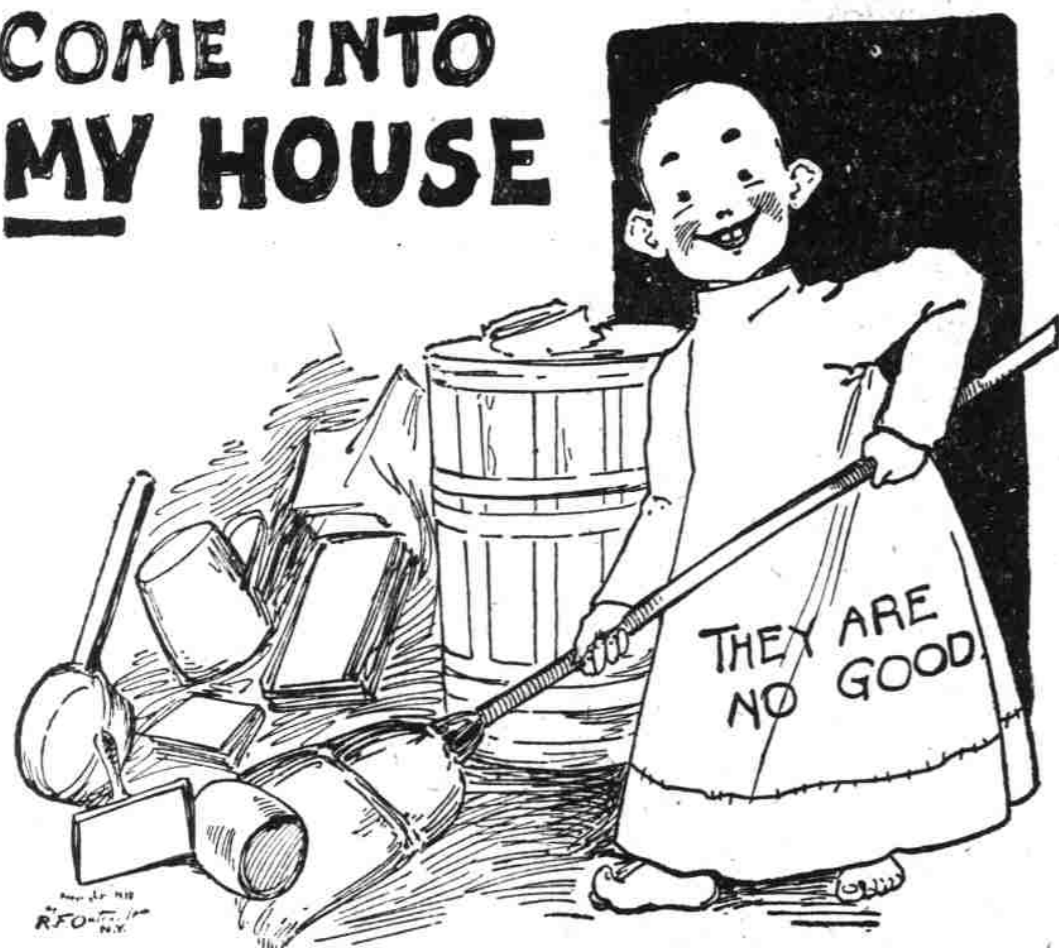
