Help the Soldier Boys

The Y. M. C. A. has launched a nation-wide campaign to secure \$35,000,000 for work of the protestant churches amongst the soldiers in this country and those who have gone abroad. North Carolina is expected to contribute \$400,000 of this amount. Person county has been asked to raise about \$1,000 of the amount.

The Y. M. C. A. has been recognized by our government as the agency through which the Protestant churches are to do their work. At the camps you will find two buildings; one on which you will see the letters, "Y. M. C. A." and the other, "K. of C." The former is the Young Men's Christian Association, the latter, Knights of Columbus. The first works for the Protestant churches, while the second is doing the work for the Catholic church.

The Young Men's Christian Association is doing a splendid work. The religious life of the young men is carefully safe-guarded. Rest rooms, bath rooms, lecture rooms, writing materials as well as desk are provided. Religious services are conducted by our wisest and most capable leaders. Much of the work is done without expense to the Y. M. C. A. but many things have to be secured to make possible the services. The demand is great. The good done cannot be estimated. The appeal is to everyone. The campaign in this county will begin on Sunday November 11th, 1917. Be ready to make some contribution to this object. If it is your boy of course you want him to have the religious influence, but if he is not yours you love him, and you will help him.

There is no money that is spent in the war that will mean more for the good of the world than the money we spend in providing for the religious needs of the young men. The government provides food, clothes and arms, the Red Cross is a sister of mercy, the Y. M. C. A. looks after the moral and spiritual life. If we fail to save our young men from moral and spiritual wreckage the cause for which we are all sacrificing will be lost. Therefore, let us give the young men our help now in these perilous days. The greatest thing, the Y. M. C. A. is doing is furnishing the young men friendship. The loneliness of camp life. The absence of parents, brothers and sisters, and friends makes life miserable. In the Y. M. C. A. they find friends who lead them into fellowship with God and man. What a wonderful work!

Will we protestants let the "K. of C." be more generous. Our righteous must exceed theirs or we cannot enter the Kingdom. They are doing good work, but we must do more. We have more. We are in touch with the great fountain of life.

KILLED BY AUTO-MOBILE SATURDAY

John Wesley King Ran Over By Floyd Capps—Kind Died Saturday Night.

A sad accident occurred Saturday afternoon when John Wesley King the fourteen year old son of Mr. John W. King was run down by an automobile driven by Floyd Capps of Jalong.

John King, with a number of other children, was returning from the circus grounds and were crossing the street at lower Main, at the time the car passed and in attempting to dodge the crowd the car struck young King, the wheels passing over his chest and crushing his lungs. The child was picked up instantly and carried to his home nearby, remaining unconscious until his death about twelve o'clock Saturday night.
