**THE FARMERS' CONDITION.**  
 "America has been thinking indus-  
 trially and commercially for two gen-  
 erations—and to great purpose. Let  
 us now think agriculturally for a  
 generation. All America is realizing  
 that she must now think agricultur-  
 ally. The backs of her farmers are  
 against the wall. The concerns of the  
 welfare of the farmers must be first  
 in politics now for many years. It is  
 demanded not just by the farmers' con-  
 dition, but by every interest in  
 America."

The above hits the nail square on  
 the head—for many, many years all  
 legislation has been in the interest of  
 industry and commerce, every one  
 being of the opinion that to build up  
 a great country infant industries  
 must be protected, losing sight of  
 the well known truth that agricul-  
 ture is the base of all prosperity.  
 North Carolina has made wonderful  
 strides industrially and commercially,  
 but the condition of the farmer is no  
 better than it was ten years ago. Of  
 course, we are aware that in this  
 good County many farmers today are  
 worth ten thousand dollars, twenty  
 thousand dollars, and even thirty  
 thousand dollars where ten years ago  
 they were worth only two thousand,  
 four thousand or six thousand dol-  
 lars—that is, if we take the tax books  
 as the record. But it is equally true  
 that many of these same farmers can  
 not sell their lands for what they are  
 valued at on the tax books.

We are not decrying the value of  
 industries and commercial enter-  
 prises, they are well and good and  
 we are glad North Carolina has many  
 of these huge enterprises, but we are  
 stating an eternal truth when we say  
 the farmer in this mad rush to help  
 big business has been overlooked, and  
 as a consequence is suffering for this  
 omission today. Take the advice given  
 in the above quotation, and let us  
 think and legislate agriculturally for  
 a generation.

The Democratic County Convention  
 will meet on next Saturday and name  
 delegates to the various conventions.  
 These conventions, both state and  
 county, are of little interest since  
 the primary, as nothing of real in-  
 terest takes place. Of course the  
 state convention will adopt a plat-  
 form, and view with alarm, endorse  
 the present state administration—  
 with Watts and Cooper left out, ad-  
 journ and go home. No, if you are  
 expecting any fire works you had  
 better save your railroad fare, for it  
 is all cut and dried long since, and  
 will be pulled off according to sched-  
 ule.

President Coolidge seems to have  
 the nomination for the presidency on  
 the Republican ticket just about sew-  
 ed up, but a nomination this year is  
 not the same as an election. Who will  
 oppose him on the Democratic ticket  
 is a matter of grave doubt. Mr. Mc-  
 Adoo is still leading but few believe  
 he will be able to command the nec-  
 essary two thirds, while Mr. Under-  
 wood and Mr. Smith are just about  
 completely eliminated—if they ever  
 were possibilities. At this writing it  
 looks as if the successful candidate  
 will be a dark horse, possibly some  
 one who has not been mentioned.

 candidate for Commissioner of Ag-
