Wallace White used as the subject of his declamation the well known classic by Kipling, "On the Road to Mandalay" and so well interpreted the part of the old British soldier longing to get back to land "where the dawn comes up like thunder, outer China cross the bay" that he brought special comment from his judges, two of whom were English professors.

A declamation contest is to be held in the near future under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher's Association and the Mandalay enthusiast will compete with his school mates for the prize offered for the best declamation in Roxboro.

The first prize in the contest held at Wake Forest was taken by Monroe high school, the second place Henderson and third place by Greensboro high school.
