A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 12 OF THE PUBLIC LAWS OF NORTH CAROLINA,

One thousand nine hundred twenty-three, relating to the Assessment of property, being the Machinery act, by providing for an annual assessment of property for taxation by the County Board of Equalization of Person County.

county board of equalization under the machinery provided under section one hundred and fourteen, et seq. of this act.

Sec. 2. That this act shall apply to Person County only.

Sec. 3. That all laws and clauses of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR PARDON.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That Chapter 12 of the Public Laws of 1923, being the Machinery Act, be, and the same is hereby, amended by changing the period at the end of Section eighteen to a colon and adding at the end of said section the following: "Provided, that this paragraph shall not apply to Person county, but there shall be in that county an annual assessment of all real and personal property by the
