No. 1, that has been broken up by this consolidation business and many of the children are seriously handicapped and some of the deprived of any school advantages whatsoever.

Now I'm not claiming that consolidation would not be a good step for this district as well as for others. But the question in my mind is? Is the time ripe for consolidation. The writer believes that the time is not ripe for consolidation for these bright eyed and bright face children or they would not have been so seriously handicapped by such steps.

If we could only look into the future we will say for two years hence I think we could see the time when consolidation would pay in this district as well as in other districts.

My reason for saying this is because the road building forces are behind with their job in this part of the county but we hope that ere the more years shall pass that we may have as good roads as the good people have in any other part of the county.

What would be the use of having a truck to continue its journey from Mt. Tirzah to the Durham County line through the heart of this district even if a truck could make the trip now all right, as soon as the winter rain begins to all the road would at once become unpassable.

Has it not occurred to you gentlemen of the Board of Education that a mistake has been made somewhere? To me it seems that there has been, and the whole situation narrows its self down to this point that you gentlemen of the Board have been too hasty in a matter of doing away with schools.

As stated above there are some children in this district who live three miles from the nearest truck station, I have in mind the children from three families who are thus handicapped and many others are handicapped in that they have a long distance to walk. The fault is gentlemen of the Board of Education, that these people have been treated with injustice of the rankst kind. They pay their taxes; are law abiding and honorable as any citizens anywhere in the county.

What these people are clamoring for is to have their school restored and they have a right to demand it. O. T. Glenn
