If you have some extra good tobacco, that may bring a fairly good price. I fully believe there will be a good crop of corn. If the farming class of people would take a deeper inexest in watermellons and canta liupes, sweet potatoes and Irish potatoes, cabbage and tomatoes; snaps beans and peas, and would pl. at about twice the amount usually planted there would be plenty on the table. I am satisfied the season will be good on all these crops.
