

Farmers Are Aroused Over Possibilities Of The Cow

Mr. V. W. Lewis, Senior Marketing Specialist, Spend Friday Here.

MR. LEWIS MAKES TALK

Mr. V. W. Lewis, Senior Marketing Specialist of the Division of the Markets, spent last Friday in Roxboro. In the afternoon he spoke to a group of representative business men and women, telling of the possibilities of marketing the produce of Person County, particularly cream, poultry, eggs and hogs.

Saturday morning Mr. Lewis left for Oxford to arrange for shipping a car load of hogs from that point at an early date. He was accompanied by some of our citizens who are interested in this marketing work. Upon their arrival in Oxford they went to the market, where farm produce is offered for sale twice each week, under the supervision of the County agent and home agent.

Then the County agent took the visitors to two farms to see the hog feeding demonstrations. On Mr. Brummitt's farm there were thirty Duroc-Jersey hogs in a pasture containing about a quarter of an acre. At the upper end of the pasture a stable afforded protection from bad weather. Large pine trees afforded generous shade, and at the foot of the hill a small stream of water gave the hogs water and good wallow.

The hogs are being fed according to the Shay method, under the supervision of Mr. Blackwell, the County agent of Granville. Each hog now weighs about 175 pounds. The feed consists of shelled corn and fish meal, supplemented by sulphur, salt and ashes. The corn and fish meal are kept in large self feeders that hold enough to supply the hogs about two weeks. The minerals are kept in a box that is divided in three sections. In one there is sulphur, in another salt—just ordinary table salt—and in the third, ashes.

These hogs weighed about 40 or 50 pounds each on March 19th, the day they were put on ration according to the Shay method. At present each hog is gaining just about 2 pounds a day. In about 75 days from the time they were put on this feed they will weigh 200 lbs. and a car load of hogs will be shipped to one of the big markets. Mr. Brummitt will have thirty hogs ready for this car, and the State Experiment Farm in Granville County, will have forty on fifty. A minimum car load consists of 75 or 80 hogs. In recent sales in Richmond hogs fed according to the Shay method have been bringing 12-12 to 14 cents, on foot. If the price continues to hold up, Mr. Brummitt will probably clear about \$300, over and above expenses, for his 75 days work. And there isn't so much work about it, since the self-feeders are on the job.

After looking at these hogs Mr. Blackwell then carried us to another lot where there were three hogs taken from this bunch when received, and fed like we are used to seeing them fed. Now, these three hogs were just as good as the others when taken from the lot, but today these three will not weigh a pound over 50, if that much. And in addition to the feed which they have consumed they are running on a clover field, getting all of the green stuff they can eat, and yet—well, you should see them.

Mr. Blackwell will be glad to go with any Person County farmers and their friends to see these hogs, and you may be assured it will be well worth your time and effort. It will take just about an hour to drive from Roxboro to Oxford. Go to the court house and ask for Mr. Blackwell, the County agent. It would be interesting if a number of neighbors or friends would arrange to make this trip together about the last of this week. You can go to Oxford, see the demonstration, and be back in Roxboro within four hours. Mr. Lewis will probably ship the hogs about the last of May.

ROXBORO INSTALLS NEW FIRE WHISTLE

Town Puts In Fire Whistle As Per Regulations Of Underwriters

FIRST SONG SATURDAY

Roxboro seems determined to meet every requirement of the Southeastern Tariff Association and secure lower insurance rates, though a rise looks to be staring us in the face, rather than a reduction.

The town has just installed a fire siren, which can be heard for miles and miles around. Last Saturday at noon it was tried out, and certainly it was satisfactory as to making noise.

The large horn is located on the top of Jackson Motor Co. and can be seen for some distance. It was used for the first time in announcing a fire Saturday night at 9 o'clock, but the alarm was a call to a small outhouse in the rear of Farmers Hardware Company, evidently the fire being caused by some one who wanted to see how the siren would sound when giving a real call.

AN EXCITING CHASE

Last Thursday night Sheriff Brooks received a tip that a party was off for a load of booze, and in company with Deputy W. R. Gentry and Chief of Police Sam Oliver, they followed the trio of liquor-hunters. About ten miles out on the Durham road the car containing the booze hunters turned to the left where they proceeded to gather their load. When the men returned from their destination the officers were waiting for them on the side of the road. Deputy Gentry, narrowly escaped the wheels of the car as it turned towards him. Mr. Gentry jumped to the side of the road as the car whizzed by. As the car headed for Roxboro, the officers resorted to their pistols in an effort to stop the occupants of the car, and the result was that several bullet holes were found in the back of the car when the three men were finally captured, together with about five gallons of moonshine. Gentry states that counting the whisky that was thrown out by the men during the chase about 10 gallons would be the amount the men had with them.

Felix Wade, driver of the car, was placed under a \$500 bond for transporting liquor, for the purpose of sale, and an additional \$200 bond for attempting to run over an officer. Luther Hogg and Oscar Jordan were both placed under a bond of \$500 each for transporting liquor.
