

Mr. D. L. James, Marketing Specialist of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture, recently visited North Carolina and then was transferred to Oregon for a survey of the dairy milk business of Portland. In a recent letter from Mr. James he says:

"It is a nice country out here and farmers are doing fairly well. Things are much different than in your state and I really believe your farmers have a better chance if they will take advantage of their opportunity. You are nearer to better markets, climate and rainfall are more favorable and soil conditions are equally as good if not better in your state. A little more diversification for your farmers and more business in the marketing of their products will put them way ahead."


