**Poultry Aids Income
To Johnston Farm**

Smithfield, N. C., Nov. 15.—A flock of poultry on the farm of T. W. Ives of Johnston County has more than made up for the low price of cotton and has returned a net cash income of \$272.01 in addition to \$300 worth of poultry left on the farm.

Mr. Ives began this year on January first with 53 hens which he carried until May 7 when the flock was reduced to 43 hens making an average of 48 hens for the year. From this flock he hatched out 384 chicks and raised 330. His financial account shows that he sold 225 chickens for \$210.04; he sold 249 1-2 dozen eggs for \$182.35; he used 172.6 dozen eggs at home valued at \$101.90; he used 37 chickens at home valued at \$50.27 and has reserved 11 more chickens for home use at a value of \$10.20. This is a total income of \$534.76 from the flock. His total expenses for feed and added equipment was \$262.75 leaving a net profit for this year of \$272.01.

This is not all. In his report to Miss Minnie Lee Garrison, home demon agent Mr. Ives states that he now has 108 hens with which to begin the new season and these are laying high priced eggs at this time. These 108 hens are valued at \$270 and six roosters selected for breeding are valued at \$39.00 which is a total of \$309 worth of well selected stock. The income from the

flock paid for feeding and raising this stock in addition to giving the net income.

Miss Garrison states that Mr. Ives is one of the best small farmers of Johnston County. He is owner of Cloverdale Farm which makes a specialty of pure bred Hampshire hogs, good seed corn and Mexican Big Bell Cotton. Mrs. Ives is his partner in the poultry venture and the income from the flock this year has aided the family in keeping on a cash basis for incidental expenses and has provided high quality food products for the family during the year.

**Hogs Kept Him
From Going Broke.**

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 15.—A. H. Oliver of Mount Olive is a young middleaged farmer with a keen mind and when a fact about better farming is presented to him in the right way, he searches through it carefully and if it is worth his attention he gives it a trial.

He did this with hogs. For over four years, Mr. Oliver and W. W. Shay, swine extension specialist at State College have been writing to other and paying one another occasional visits. Mr. Oliver became

interested in the breeding and feeding of swine according to the demonstrated methods and decided to give it a trial. On November 6, he wrote to Mr. Shay saying, "I have marketed two carloads of hogs this year and now have 106 pigs just weaning. I shall begin breeding my hogs next week. My hog sales for the year, to date, have been about \$3,800. I am just turning my pigs on the soybean fields with access to shelled corn, meal, middlings, fish meal and minerals. If this course is unwise, please write me at once."

Mr. Oliver stated further that he plan to have rye on new land with which to fatten his pigs in the spring. The rye will then be plowed under and the land planted to corn for hogging down in the fall.

"I have made over 1,400 barrels of potatoe sand over 100 bales of cotton this year," he says, "but hogs have kept me from going broke."

Mr. Shay disagrees with his correspondent when he says that hogs kept him from going broke. It was the combination of hogs and the knowledge of how to make them profitable that kept Mr. Oliver on a cash basis this year. The 106 young mortgage lifters are being handled so as to be ready for finishing next year at the least possible cost and with the greatest gains.
