Much has been said of recent years about contributing weekly or at least monthly, but this is not practical with the farmer, for he does not receive his wages or cash on regular stated periods, but must of necessity pay in the fall when he markets his cash crop. If he has pledged by the week he gets behind in his payments during the summer and when fall comes he feels that he has so many obligations which are pressing him—and you know, the Lord does not personally nag you about what you owe Him, consequently you just naturally put off paying your church obligation, but if you have planted God's acre, and are honest, when you sell it you know to whom it belongs, and you talk up like a man and turn it into the Lord's treasury.

In another column will be found an article from Rev. L. V. Coggins telling what this idea has done for one of his churches, Lambeth Memorial, and we feel sure if the other churches of the County would adopt it the financial solution would be solved. He also mentions that the ladies should give all eggs produced on Sunday, and this is not a bad idea. We would that every country church in the County would give this God's Acre plan a trial, for we believe it is worthwhile.

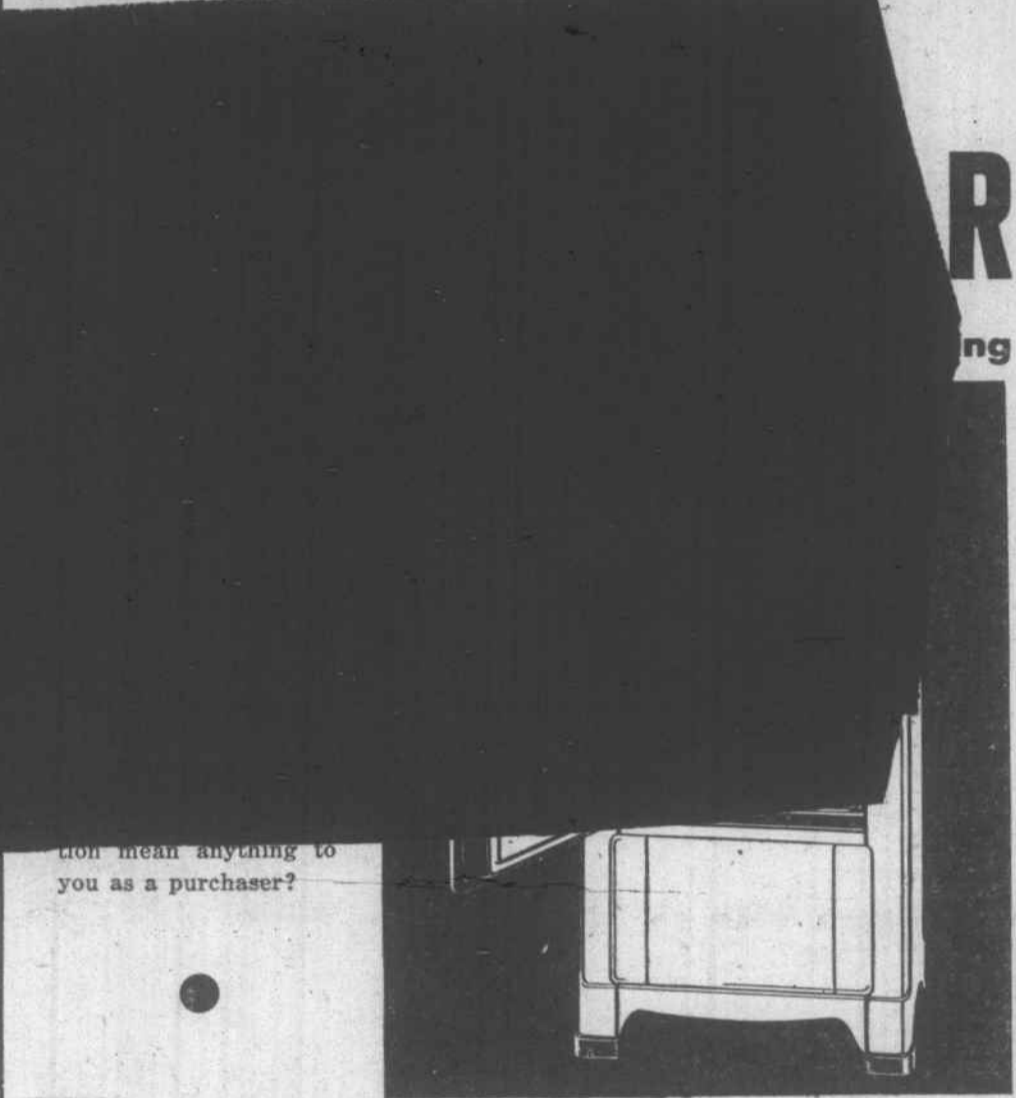

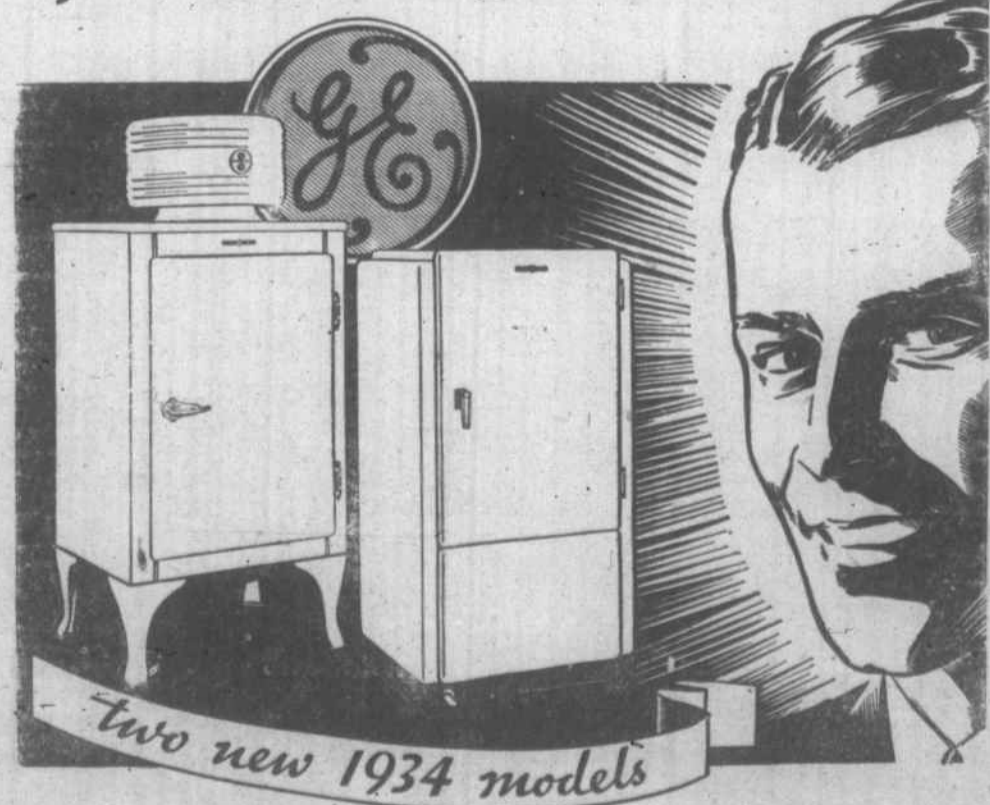

HINTS FOR THE HOME

Water spots on waxed wood may be easily removed by rubbing in circles with a flannel cloth moistened in turpentine.

Glass stoppers may easily be removed from bottles by heating the neck of the bottle in hot water. The water should not be so hot as to break the bottle.

Oilcloth will brighten up if washed with a solution of borax and water, and wiped with a flannel cloth that has been dipped in milk and wrung as dry as possible.

The skin of tomatoes may be removed by placing them in a basin, pouring boiling water over them, and allowing them to stand a few moments. The skin will peel off

then, without trouble.

Glass which has become cloudy will be quickly restored to its original clearness and luster if a little vinegar is used on it. Or, if washing soda is used in warm water, instead of soap, the same effect will result.

Top-dressing small grain with quick-acting, soluble nitrogen fertilizer will help to overcome the effects of the recent cold weather.
