THREE MAY DIE IN CHAIR FRIDAY

Convicted Slayers Of Howard Jernigan Wait For Execution

For the first time since the electric chair was installed at the State Prison here nearly a quarter of a century ago, North Carolina next Friday may take the lives of three men on the same day for the crime

of murder. Tom Johnson, alias Johnny Johnson, Preston Howard and Johnny Hart, all Negroes, are now on death row under sentence to forfeit their lives Friday for the murder on December 21, 1933 of Howard Jernigan, filling station operator, in Sampson County.

Parole Commissioner Edwin M. Gill said tonight that he had been studying the cases of the trio, and that he would take the matter up with Governor Ehringhaus early this week. A decision as to whether clemency will be extended any of the men or whether they will all die the same day will be rendered in the next two or three days.
