SEN. HUEY LONG SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

United States Senator Shot Twice; Assailant Is Slain By Bodyguards

Bullet Fired Into Body Of The Louisiana Political Dictator By Dr. C. A. Weiss, Jr. Of Baton Rouge

SHOOTING OCCURRED IN CAPITOL BUILDING OUTSIDE HOUSE DOOR

Long Was Just Leaving House Chamber When Dr. Weiss, Without Warning, Opened Fire at Close Range; Dr. Weiss Member of Prominent Anti-Long Family; Attacker's Body Is Riddled With Bullets And Allowed To Lay In Corridor Until Arrival Of Coroner; Long Rushed To Hospital, Where His Condition Was Pronounced Serious, But Not Critical; Bullet Did Not Strike Vital Organs; Expected To Recover Unless Complications Arke.

Baton Rouge, La., Sept. 8.-Senator I'mg was shot and wounded seriously at the State Capitol tonight by Dr. C. A. Weiss, Jr., eye specialist of Baton Rouge and member of an anti-Long political family, who was quickly slain by the Louisiana "dictator's" body-

An hour and a half after the shooting, Long was given a blood transfusion at Our Lady of the Lake Infirmary, where attendants said the Senator's wound consisted of a bullet hole through the stomach.

Long remained conscious as physicians worked over him. Blood for the transfusion was provided by Lieutenant Governor James A. Noe, close personal and political ally of the Sena-

While Long lay on the operating table at the hospital, physicians there clock, said they were making a check to determine whether the pistol bullet that entered his right side was poisoned,

Weiss was a son-in-law of a district judge whose office was threatened by a bill before the Long-dominated legislature now in session to enact new Long "dictatorship" and anti-

Roosevelt legislation. Identification of Weiss was established by Dr. Thomas B. Bird, East Baton Rouge Parish coroner, and Joe W. Bates, assistant superintendent of the State Bureau of Identification.

Senator Long had just finished diquestion.

As the Senator stepped out of the House door, spectators said, Dr. Weiss, walked up to Long and, pressing the muzzle of a pistol close to his body, fired one shot. Then the bodyguards opened fire killing the doctor, and assisted Senator Long down the stairs to an automobile.

Bled At Mouth
