The Associated Press sent out the following statement last night:

President Wilson telegraphed Governor Johnson, of California. asking whether anti-lien legislation could be held up until Secretary Bryan could go to California personally to explain the federal government's position and urge a readjustment of the controversy.

The Presilent's telegram was in response to Governor John son's message yesterday that California desired to co-operate with the federal government to avoid international difficulties. President's telegram read:

This telegram was duplicated to the President of the Senate and Speaker of the California Assembly.

At the White House it was felt that conflicting advices over situation made it practically necessary for a representative of the administration to explain the government's exact position in person. The officials said there was no feeling that the President's suggestion would not be welcome because Governor Johnson's telegram yesterlay was regarded as expressing a desire for the fullest co-operation between the state and the federal govern-


