Gen. Polk graduated in 1832 and soon after entered the ministry, and afterwards was Bishop of Arkansas and Louisiana. At the breaking out of the war he entered the Confederate army and was raised to the distinction of Lieutenant General. He was killed by Sherman's army at Marietta, Ga., June 14th 1864.

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
